CHURCH WHEAT TURNED OVER

BISHOP NIBLEY DIRECTS RELEASE OF LARGE QUANTITY OF GRAIN

Latter Day Saints in Utah Find Good Use for Savings of the Church Relief Society.

The Deseret News of Salt Lake City says:

One of the most interesting phases of the food situation was brought before local Church and civic circles today with the announcement by Presiding Bishop C. W. Nibley this morning that the wheat saved by Relief society women since 1876 was to be turned over to the government for use in the big war. As to just what this wheat would amount to Bishop Nibley stated it would be difficult to estimate, as the grain had in the past been kept fairly well on the move, being used in some districts for spring planting in order that a greater yield might be obtained and again sold in some instances in order that the new fall wheat might be purchased. In the latter case the bishop stated the orders were in many cases already with the miller's awaiting the turning in of the grain. However, according to the last report given out by the Relief society there was on hand at the time of the spring April conference 205,518 bushels, a great part of this, about 5,305,307 pounds in the presiding bishop's storehouse and some 20,000 bushels stored at Richfield.

Bishop Nibley stated this morning that the government, through the food administration, had requested the turning in of all the Relief society wheat for use in the present war. In accordance with this request the presiding bishop's office, he said, is sending out letters to all ward Relief societies asking that the societies comply with the government's request. The price given for the wheat, according to the bishop, will, of course, be that fixed by the government, varying according to the points of delivery. The money, he stated, was to be put safely in the banks by the various organizations and re-invested after the coming harvest so that the terms of the trust given the women of the Church should be fully complied with, the wheat fund being a trust fund, established by President Brigham Young against days of famine and for the relief of the poor. The government, it was also stated, had given its guarantee that the wheat should be replaced with the coming harvest.

Started by President Young.

The gathering of the wheat by the women of the Church has probably been one of the most unique movements among modern people. Back of the entire movement stands the quaint figure of Mrs. Emmeline B. Wells, who was entrusted with the starting of the movement by President Young. The wheat gathered was originally supposed to come from gleanings, from donations and from purchases made with funds devoted to the purpose. While the need for this sort of charity work was greater at the time of its inauguration than for many years past, the gathering and storing of the grain has been one of the most important parts of the Relief society work. Among Church officials this morning it was generally felt that the request of the government for the wheat was rather forcible proof of the value of the movement, the purpose of which had, of course, taken on a wider and greater significance with the outbreak of the war and the famine crisis facing the world today.

A special significance was also given the matter, it was felt today, as some 7,000 or 8,000 Utah boys enlisted in the national service are among those for whom the wheat is being turned over to the government—in many cases the very boys whose mothers have so carefully gathered the big world necessity. The giving of daily bread to these guardians of the nation's honor and to the poor war-torn starving peoples of Europe, it was declared, was ample justification for the release of the carefully saved wheat.
