MEMORIAL AT RIVERSIDE

EXERCISES LARGELY ATTENDED REGARDLESS OF WEATHER

Home Guards Have Paced Charge of Grounds and Five the Salute

Regardless of the unreasonable condition of the weather there was a large attendance at the Memorial program at Riverside Park yesterday. The crowds were a reminder of the Chautauqua season on account of the large number present.

The program at the pavilion, which was in charge of Mrs. August Nelson of the W. R. C., was opened with invocation by Rev. Upton H. Gibbs and reading of proclamation by Rev. Smith.

There was special music interspersed with the other exercises, and J. W. Faulk, Grand Army veteran, officiated as chairman.

The memorial address was given by Dr. Peese and was received with the deepest interest. The speaker brought home with a well ordered presentation the special significance of the day and the necessity of setting the same aside as the time for solemn contemplation.

After the program at the pavilion the launching of the boat and the casting of flowers took place at the bridge. The boat, which was an imitation battle ship, was provided by August Nelson, and the song which accompanied the floral showering was entitled "Casting Flowers Upon the Waters." This piece of music, which was composed by a resident of Salem, had been dedicated to Mrs. Cora M. Davis, of Union.

The La Grande battalion of the Oregon state guard had general charge of the grounds and their part of the program was carried in perfect order. One of the acts of the home guards was the firing of a salute, sounding "taps" as a fitting conclusion to the events of the day.

METHODIST CHURCH PEOPLE HONOR MEMBERS IN WAR

Out of a Total of Forty-Two 'Heroes of the Stars Are of Gold'

The service flag of the Methodist Episcopal Church was dedicated with appropriate ceremonies at the church Sunday evening. There was special music for the occasion which included a quartette by Misses Marguerite and Gladys Winters and Messrs. Knaut and Hasfert.

Vocal solos were also rendered by Mrs. Ruth Winters and Mrs. Gambel. Brief but very appropriate addresses were given by Capt. A. W. Nelson and Capt. H. E. Dixon. The dedicatory address was delivered by Dr. Peese who spoke with great depth of feeling at the occasion which brought the congregation together.

The M. E. church service flag contains forty-two stars, three of which are in gold, representing the "supreme sacrifice" made by Elieghton Fitzgerald, who was killed in action with the British forces, and Bert Andrews and Gordon Gillman, both of whom died in France.
