### UNDER FEDERAL CONTROL

#### Government Will Take Charge of Pullman Car Service

WASHINGTON, July 3.—The Pullman Car company will be operated under federal control, the railroad administration has announced. Pullman employees will not get the basic eight hour day, but 19,000 employees will be given wage increases of \$21,750,000 annually including back pay from January 1.

### WAS CHEERING NEWS

#### Soldiers in France Inspired Over the Ship Building

WASHINGTON, July 3.—"No more defiant answer could be given to the enemy's challenge." This was the message received from General Pershing in reply to Chairman Hurley, of the Shipping Board informing the American fighting men in France that the shipbuilders at home would launch 100 merchant ships July 4.

"The launching of 100 ships on the Fourth of July is the most inspiring news there has come to us," General Pershing said. "All ranks of the Army in France send their congratulations and heartfelt thanks to their patriotic brothers in the shipyards at home. No more defiant answer could be given to the enemy's challenge. With such backing we cannot fail to win. All hail, American shipbuilders."

### DIAZ REBELS TAKE TOWN.

#### Garrison At Reynosa On Rio Grande Border Captured.

McALLEN, Tex., July 2.—A band of 150 Felicitas made a surprise attack on the garrison at Reynosa, across the Rio Grande from Hidalgo, today, and captured the city after a bloodless skirmish, according to reports received here. Reynosa is a fortified town and was occupied by Carranzista troops.

Felicitas are adherents of Felix Diaz, a nephew of the late President Porfirio Diaz, of Mexico.

### COPPER PRICE 26 CENTS.

War Industries Board Announces Two And A Half Cents Advance. WASHINGTON, July 3.—The price of copper has been fixed at 26 cents per pound, an advance of 2 1/2 cents over the former price, the War Industries Board tonight announced.

The new price, which is subject to the approval of President Wilson, went into effect today and will continue until August 15.

### "SOMEWHERE" BEING DROPPED

#### Recent Soldiers' Letters Give Writer's Location.

Letters received from soldiers in France the past few days are of special interest for the reason that the mysterious "somewhere" is not used and the actual locality is given. A letter from Jay McMillan, of Alice, is dated at Bordeaux. A letter received this morning by Mrs. Sargent shows that her husband, Sgt. W. Donald Sargent, is at Clairmont Ferrand. This is presumably the location of an artillery school.

### CANADA SENDS MANY MEN

#### Total of 400,000 Sent to War and 100,000 Are in Reserve.

LONDON, via Ottawa, June 27.—Canada already has sent 400,000 men to the war and has another 100,000 in reserve. T. C. Norris, Premier of Manitoba, announced last night in addressing a meeting at Edinburgh.

Premier Norris said he anticipated that 135,000,000 bushels of wheat would be produced by Canada this year.

### "SPANISH GRIP" FEARED.

#### Steamer Thoroughly Fumigated And Passengers Undergo Examination.

AN ATLANTIC PORT, July 3.—As a precaution against the introduction into this country of the "Spanish influenza" recently reported as prevalent in Spain, a Spanish passenger liner which arrived here today was thoroughly fumigated and those on board subjected to thorough examination by Federal and state health officers.
