### CIRCUS INFORMATION.

The attraction—Sells-Floto Circus. The location—The Bench.

The performances—This afternoon at 2 o'clock and tonight at 8 o'clock, doors opening one hour earlier.

The concert by the celebrated Sells-Floto circus band begins at 7:30 o'clock and the Mysterious Widow makes her appearance at the same time.

The annex—Open until 10 o'clock tonight. Freaks and curiosities.

Circus day appears to be coming quite often this summer, as the Sells-Floto circus, here today, is the second one to reach La Grande within the past few weeks, but then, it is not a bit too often for the small boy, and for some of the larger ones. In fact, notwithstanding some hesitancy to acknowledge it, no one ever is too old or overgrown to enjoy the circus, the other things may seem more important at the moment.

Early this morning the kiddies began gathering at the railway yards, but the train did not reach La Grande until about 8 o'clock. However, the small boy was ready to "superintend" the unloading of the mammoth amusement enterprise. Just as soon as the cars were "spotted" the detouring began. The great draft horses were led from their traveling stables and soon were pulling all the rolling stock of the circus from the flats. The wagons holding the cooking department equipment were the first of the huge circus vehicles to find their way to the ground and the big cook-house tents were soon pitched on the circus lot near the Court house.

When the fast of the wagons reached the show grounds, several of the big tents were up. Then scores of the tent men went to breakfast while other circus people were preparing for the parade.

Four flag bearers announced the coming of the street pageant and they had scarcely been seen approaching towards Adams avenue when the sounds of the first circus band were heard. And there were three of them. Then came the open dens with their wild animals, which were great attractions for the children. There were several cages of lions and lionesses, and there were several little cub lions in the cages with their mothers. Tigers, leopards, pumas, jaguars and other of their kind were there also.

The herd of elephants, some of the largest with any traveling organization, were there, and they seemed to be on splendid terms with each other, as they wobbled along, each having hold of the tail of the one in front.

The old wrinkled hippopotamus was present, taking his morning bath, notwithstanding the children along the streets shamed him for being so immodest as to bathe in front of such large crowds. But then, Baby Hip, as he is known by the circus folk, is only nine years old and he was never taught differently, as his mamma died when he was just a little kid trying to walk.

When the hyenas came 'long, the circus day sightseers had a glimpse of the only animals of the kind in the world, as there are only five of them and Sells-Floto has them.

"The great big turkeys" (meaning the ostriches), were also there, and so were the sacred oxen, the horned horse and the camels.

But one of the most pleasing features was Miss Liberty, who was costumed in satin of red white and blue. She was seated on a beautiful white horse, which held its position on a specially constructed circus vehicle, and this feature was one of the most pleasing to the eye. And Miss Liberty had her attendants, 12 of them. Many were the hands given the patriotic section.

Music was found in plenty. Besides the bands, there were three callopes, and something else. That clown band was seated atop one of the parade wagons, and while the joys were not blowing out chunks of discord music they were flirting with our girls. But that is natural with circus clowns, as they are almost as big flirts as the circus widow.

There was one circus wagon, one of the strongest ever constructed, however, that failed to appear in the parade, and this one is the specially constructed steel home of Colossus, the giant gorilla, the only animal of the kind in captivity. Colossus is a powerful "being" and only a day or two ago became angry and, with a stroke of one of his hands, struck his trapeze bar, an iron rod two inches thick, snapping it in two as if it had been a toothpick.

The parade was a splendid one and the performance this afternoon is up to the Sells-Floto standard, which means the very best acts in the circus profession. The shows this year are under the management of Henry B. Gentry, founder of the famous Gentry Brothers Dog and Pony Shows, and this means that there is plenty to amuse the children ranging from the little tots up to the aged. So we would advise all to go early.

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
