Ivory Phonograph Needles.
The phonograph stylus of vegetable ivory has a decided advantage over the old wooden needle, the usefulness of which is finished when it has played one record. The ivory point will stand the wear of six records, then when it has been filed over the bevel end can be used on six more. The vegetable ivory is produced by a Central and South American growth, the phytolus palm, which produces large clusters of seeds.
