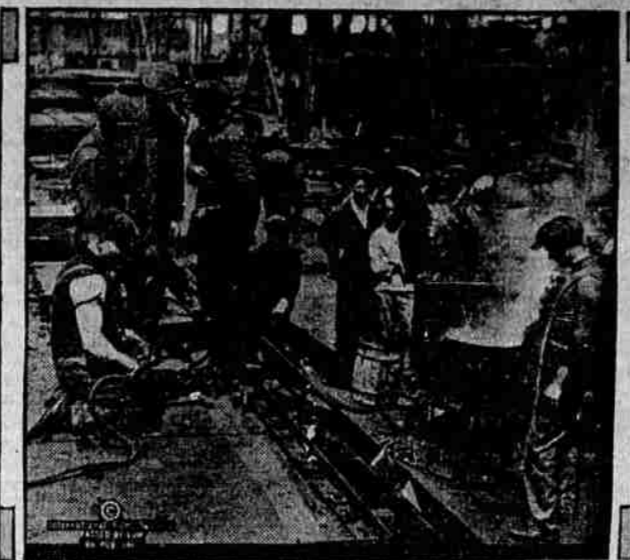

### WAR GARDENS IN THE COUNTY GRAIN GRADING SCHOOL TO OPEN

If you want to see something of the beauties of the war gardens in Union county, just take an afternoon off, and either use "Sanks' mare" or an auto, ride out of the city a little ways—say six or seven miles, and bordering either side of the road leading to Union, you will find, besides handsome bungalows, many war gardens, being carefully tended by patriotic citizens to help Uncle Sam raise enough "Garden Sash" for his soldiers in France. It is simply an inspiring sight, and one long to be remembered. Rows upon rows of potatoe plants in bloom, the bright little blossoms telling of tender young potatoes almost ready for mother's famous dish: "Have some potatoes in cream son?" That particular mother's son, probably is fighting the good fight for freedom "somewhere in France."

As you approach the border of Union proper, you will be much surprised, as I was to see very large gardens in which not only potatoes but corn and cabbages are almost ready for harvesting and these same gardens are in setting of grass as green as that of any of the much celebrated Kentucky Blue Grass meadows lying closely cropped, like a smooth piece of butter, on a slice of bread—only it is of the brightest emerald hue that would turn a true Irishman green with envy for her we have the use of the water system of Union. Dotted here and there are fine shade trees, or maybe a stray cherry tree with its bright fruit inviting you to lie down on this green mantle read your Sunday paper while enjoying fresh from the tree above you a dish of ripe cherries.

Do you get the picture? In the little city of Union are many improvements this year, with a new school house, or two handsome churches and improved business blocks besides some really handsome country homes all pointing to a prosperity for the people who live there, that, I was told is largely due to good crops this year—not so bounteous as the year before except on the irrigated lands which offset the balance.

#### BEGINS THURSDAY AND CONTINUES FOR TWO DAYS.

Movement is Being Promoted by Paul H. Spillman, County Agent.

A grain grading school will be held in La Grande at the Y. M. C. A. building, beginning at 9 o'clock Thursday morning, July 11 and will continue the two following days. Similar schools have been held at Pendleton, The Dalles and Moro. These schools are held under the direction of Prof. G. R. Hyslop of O. A. C. and in co-operation with the grain standards division of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The school will be for the benefit of any who are interested in the government grain grades as they are in effect at the present time. The only expense will be a fee of \$2.

There are very few who know the various grades of wheat, as they are in effect at the present time. It is to the interest of both buyer and seller that both be acquainted with the grades as they apply to the varieties we grow here.

The buyer will experience less trouble in dealing with parties who are acquainted with the grades than with people who do not understand the present grades. On the other hand, the seller will be better satisfied if he has a fair idea of what grade his wheat is than when he sells and has to depend entirely on the other man's say-so, even though he has the right of appeal. Mr. Paul Spillman who submits this report, further says: "We have some conception as to the value of other crops and live stock we offer for sale, and why not know what our wheat is and the place it should find on the market. If you are interested, let me know immediately."—Paul H. Spillman, county agent.

Souled bids will be received by the Oregon State Highway Commission at the office of its Chairman, at 1301 Yeon Building, Portland, Oregon, at 11 a.m. on the 9th day of July, 1918, for grading work in Union County, between La Grande and Enterprise, locally known as the Elgin-Minam Project, as follows: Approximately 48,000 cubic yards of excavation. The length of the

improvement is approximately 9.55 miles.

This is a co-operative post road project, the government and State furnish funds jointly, the work, however, is to be under the direction and supervision of the State Highway Engineer.

No bids will be considered unless accompanied by cash, bidder's bond or certified check for an amount equal to at least five per cent of the total amount of the bid.

A corporate surety bond will be required for the faithful performance of the contract in a sum equal to one-half the total amount of the bid. All proposals must be delivered in person by the bidder or his duly authorized agent at the place and hour above-mentioned. Proposal blanks and full information for bidders may be obtained

at the office of the State Highway Commission and State Highway Engineer at Salem, Ore.

Plans and specifications and forms of contract may be seen at the same place and at the office of the Division Engineer, M. O. Bennett, Pendleton, Oregon, or may be obtained from the Salem office upon the deposit of \$5.
