THEA BARA IN "THE ROSE OF BLOOD."

The type of woman who composed Russia's famous Legion of Death is being shown at the Sherry Theater, last showing today, where Thea Bara is portraying the heroine of "The Rose of Blood." This William Fox picture, which shows the underplots leading up to the gigantic revolution, has an engrossing interest seldom seen in historical dramas.

This big spectacle combines the name of its noted star with a story distinctly worth seeing. Into the eventful life of one heroine, the scenario writer has been able to crowd a host of incidents which, in their total, make up a story of powerful force.

Lisa Tapewa is a girl of the people who attracts a Prince to her feet, and marries him. She carries with her, into her high station, the hatred she has always felt toward the ruling class of her country. She is headed with a group of revolutionaries, and she has promised to carry out their will insofar as she is able.

The Chief of the Secret Police is the first to come under the power of her enmity. Then, one after another, several high governmental officials, who have exercised tyrannical powers of the populace, are killed. The great moment comes when Lisa is commanded to assassinate her own husband, now Prime Minister.

Wavering between her love for him and her sense of the duty due her people, Lisa finally lets the right conquer. She blows up the building which houses her husband and the other members of his cabinet.

All Have Big Roles in This Great Production.

Three big stars are seen in the newest World-Picture "Vengeance." They are Montague Love, Barbara Castleton and Madge Evans, and all three of these famous and popular stars are seen in powerful and effective roles.

Mr. Love has two roles in this picture. He is first seen as John Cuddleston, an Englishman, who is driven from his home by his brother, and who goes to India and there marries an Indian woman. YANKEES ENTERTAIN

Doughboys Give a Show Out in the Woods

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN FRANCE, June 18.—(By Mail)—All along that part of the line they're still talking about the "party at the front with women to it" which the boys of the —th staged. The —th figures it put one over on all the other regiments in a social way, and what's more the other regiments have to admit it.

It came about this way. The boys appreciated the doughnuts the Salvation Army sisters had been making for them when all the fellows were in the trenches, and also the work the Y. M. C. A. women were doing to make war more pleasant.

So one company decided to put on a show back in the woods to entertain the women. Then another company wanted to join in, and another, until pretty soon five companies had brought forth talent, and they called it a "vaudeville."

Back in a certain thick woods they found an open space about as large as a big theatre, and about the same shape. At one end they put up a stage under some trees, and blankets made good enough curtains, when moved back and forth on a wire. The flowers and branches made fine scenery, and the ground was as good an orchestra pit as you ever saw when the regimental band took its place in it.

No Reserved Seats.

Doughboys from the front who could be spared were allowed to come back to the woods the night before, so the boches wouldn't see any troop movement, and before the show began they sprang from every bush and tree, and folded their legs under them on Nature's unreserved seat, the ground.

The committee in charge had detailed one group to "scare up" a piano. They got one, no one knows where, except they—it had a German name on it, and it turned out tip-top American music when the rag-time kid from C company sat down to "syncopate."

So everyone was happy and asked no questions, but just wished he could wait up to one of the "ladies" and say, "This is our dance, isn't it?" Which would have started a riot sure if anyone had done it, because there were only seven girls to fifteen hundred boys. Anyway, there wasn't any hall room.

And just before the program started with Hawaiian songs by the stringed quartet, somebody looked up and saw an American "sausage" balloon directly overhead. The observer wasn't invited, they say, but he was looking down half the time and toward Germany the other half, and it's a safe bet he didn't miss much of the program.

Quite a Program.

They had skits—and boxing, and songs, and band music, and the star feature brought "Lady Evelyn," the Hula-Hula dancer. Everybody thought "Lady Evelyn" really was a lady, with her miming steps and ballet movements, until some one pulled off the wig and the boys recognized the assistant cook in B Company.

Somebody said they couldn't stage a doughboy show to which women could come and still have it funny. But they showed skeptical ones, and everybody had to laugh with the fun and be serious with the "homesicky" songs, which were popular and there wasn't a single "unsanitary" feature to the program.

As the chaplain said, after they'd called on the "Holy Joe" for a talk, everything passed the censor. Nobody "cussed" a single "cuss" word, and the colonel said in the bully speech he made at the end of the performance, he couldn't tell them how proud he was of them because they'd been in the trenches a long time and every doughboy was absolutely clean.

Mr. Grain Farmer:

Are you prepared to handle your grain in bulk? Do not wait until Spring and Summer when you are buried with work and worried with labor shortage, but build your granaries now.

You can buy the lumber and roofing paper for a first-class 1000 bushel portable granary for \$54.58 and it will last for years. Sacks for the same amount of grain will cost you \$125.00 and this would be a dead loss against this year's crop.

A granary of this size can be moved anywhere and can be filled directly from the thresher, doing away with high priced labor handling and sewing sacks.

The boys in the trenches need the sacks for sand bags for the protection of their very lives and perhaps your boy is among them.

Spend your money in your own valley by buying lumber manufactured at home. When you buy sacks part of the money goes to India.

BUILD YOUR GRANARIES NOW

Be prepared by building them before the farming season opens up. Be sure to get good lumber, well seasoned, as low grade lumber will give you trouble in a few seasons. Don't use green lumber.

Save money—keep what you spend at home—prevent loss and damage from exposure to weather—leave the sacks for our boys in the trenches; help win the war by building granaries now.
