HARVESTING IS NOW UNDER WAY

CUTTING MACHINES ARE IN FIELDS NEAR IMBLER.

Crop Output Believed To Be Better Than Indications Showed A Few Weeks Ago.

Harvesting has begun in a few of the fields in the Imbler and Sumnerville sections. While the work is not yet in full swing some of the grain has sufficiently matured to permit of a beginning. For some reason unexpected the grain is ripening at an earlier period than usual. The season appears to be from a week to ten days ahead of the average years.

While there have been no accurate means of determining the output, it is the general belief that the yield will be at least from fair to good, but of course below the "bumper" quantity. A number of the prominent farmers express the conviction that the results will be considerably ahead of what was expected two or three weeks ago.

Help Will Be Scarce.

The condition this year enforces a practical reminder of the earlier days when a popular piece of sacred melody proclaimed: "The harvest is great and the laborers few." Lots of the young men have been called to the colors; others have been attracted by the high wages and less prosaic surroundings of the shipyards and other government industries.

There is hardly a grain farm of any consequence in the county that has not had the loss of an experienced hand or two, and in one or two cases as high as four or five.

Threshing In Umatilla.

The early harvest season is more noticeable in Umatilla county, which is normally from two to four weeks ahead of this section. A report printed in the East Oregonian yesterday says:

"Two carloads of new wheat, the first to be shipped from Umatilla county this year, are going forward today, being shipped to Adams and Eastland by H. W. Collins. In both instances the wheat is from the farm of L. L. Rogers, and is forty fold. The car at Eastland is being loaded today by S. R. Thompson.

"The shipment of new wheat at this time is exceedingly early, being several weeks ahead of the usual schedule and illustrates the earliness of the harvesting this year."

WILL FORBID CENSORSHIP

PRESIDENT SAYS NEWS WIRES WILL BE RESPECTED.

Senate Amendment On Question Of News Handling By Wire Is Pending.

WASHINGTON, D.C., July 12.—(By United Press.)—President Wilson will forbid any censorship of news dispatches while the wires are under government control. Congressional leaders, press associations and press bureaus are assured that their messages will be left undisturbed, and the President asked that Senate be so informed, so that the fears that Postmaster-General Burleson might establish a censorship of news dispatches might be allayed. The President also said that the leased wires to newspapers would not be interfered with.

However, Senators Reed and Walton announced that they will press for passage of an amendment providing for the elimination of leased wires from government control.

Mossman, chairman of the military relief committee of the grand chapter of La Grande, stated this morning that she is glad to announce that yesterday about 20 more workers showed at headquarters in the Elks Temple, and more would be welcomed, for the chapter this morning received an order to make at once 500 girls dresses for the refugees in France, and this order will soon be followed by other large orders, which will keep the chapter busy until late in the fall and well into the winter.

There are about 100 girls employed in the local railroad offices, who have agreed to work one evening each week, in addition to 85 Honor Guard Girls, who also give one evening each week. But these workers are not enough to carry out the work this chapter has in hand, and with other large orders coming in the near future, an appeal now is being made to all the patriotic women of La Grande, or Union county, to volunteer their services for at least one day each week.
