BRAVE FAG-AN-BALLAGH FIGHTERS AND MANY OTHERS WHOSE IRISH VALOR IS CLEARING THE WAY IN FRANCE



There are no better fighting men in the British Army than the Irish troops. They have proved this in many a hard-fought battle. The Royal Irish Fusiliers are called 'Fag-an-Ballagh' boys, a Gaelic phrase indicating that they 'clear the way.' There are so many famous Irish regiments that all of them cannot be named here. Among the best are the Munster Fusiliers, the Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers, the Royal Guards, the Dublin Fusiliers, the Royal Irish Regiment, the Royal Irish Rifles and the Connaught Rangers, with whom Brigadier General W. A. White of the British and Canadian Recruiting Mission saw strenuous service in South Africa.

These splendid soldiers come from both the north and south of Ireland. One of the first heroes of the present war was Private Michael O'Leary, who single-handedly attacked and killed an incredible number of the enemy and won the Victoria Cross. O'Leary started his war service as a private in the Connaught Rangers, and he is now a captain. His whole career indicates that he does not know what the word 'fear' means.

Another splendid fighting man who has won the Military Cross in the Battle of the Somme, in September 1917, is the Irish Guards saw very strenuous fighting in the Battle of the Somme. They carried all their objectives in their attack and then found themselves flanked by a nest of machine guns known as The Quadrilateral, and were subjected to a heavy fire from the rear.

"Finally," said Captain MacMahon, "a blooming tank rode over the wire entanglements, smashing the wire and another regiment. I got hit on the head by a piece of shell and was bowled over, but fortunately I had on one of the tin hats, as we call the steel helmets, and it broke the force of the blow.

NO SUGAR REQUIRED CROWDER IS EXPERT SLACKER GOES TO JAIL

Fruit Juices Will Supply Their Own Sweetening

WASHINGTON, July 13.—Sweet fruit syrups require no sugar in the making and may be used in place of sugar in several ways in general cooking, according to specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture. Apple syrup is especially good for cakes, hot biscuits, candies and seasoning.

To make it add 5 ounces of powdered calcium carbonate to 7 gallons of apple cider. Powdered calcium carbonate (carbonate of lime) or, to give it its common name, precipitated chalk, is low-priced and harmless. Boil the mixture in a kettle or put vigorously for five minutes. Pour the liquid into vessels, preferably glass jars or pitchers; allow to stand six or eight hours, or until perfectly clear. Pour the clear liquid into a preserving kettle. Do not allow sediment at bottom to enter. Add to the clear liquid one level teaspoonful of lime carbonate and stir thoroughly. The process is completed by boiling down rapidly to a clear liquid. Use density gauge or candy thermometer and bring the temperature up to 220 degrees F. If a thermometer is not available, boil until bulk is reduced to one-seventh of the original volume. To determine whether the syrup is cooked enough test as for candy—by pouring a little into cold water. If boiled enough it should have the consistency of maple syrup. It should not be cooked long enough to harden like candy when tested.

When the test shows that the syrup has been cooked enough, pour it into fruit jars, pitchers, etc., and allow it to cool slowly. Slow cooling is important, as otherwise the suspended matter will not settle properly and the syrup will be cloudy.

A good way to insure slow cooling is to stand the vessels, full of syrup, in a bucket or a wash boiler of hot water or to place them in a fireless cooker. The white sediment which settles out during cooking is called "malate of lime" and is a harmless compound of lime with the natural acid of the apple. When the syrup is cooled, it should be stored in fruit jars, bottles, or jugs and corks. Place the rubber and cap or cotton stopper or cork in position and tighten. Place the container in boiling hot water and sterilize for the length of time given below for the particular type of outfit used:

- Water bath, homemade or commercial..... 15
- Water seal, 214 degrees..... 10
- 5 pounds steam pressure..... 8
- 10 pounds steam pressure..... 5

Remove jars and tighten covers. Invert to cool, and test the joints. Store for future use. This recipe is for making syrup primarily for home consumption. If the product is to be sold, legal requirements as to labeling should be ascertained and complied with.

CROWDER IS EXPERT

Provost General Made the Subject His Special Study.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 13.—(By United Press.)—When the call came to Provost General Enoch Crowder to handle Uncle Sam's big selective draft, he was ready because he had spent his entire army career in preparation.

Rep. Greene, Vermont, who, as member of the house military affairs committee has come into intimate contact with Gen. Crowder, tells how the latter spent a life time studying for the big job he now holds.

"When Gen. Crowder was a junior lieutenant at an obscure army post in Texas he chanced upon copy of old civil war draft regulations," Greene said.

"He read them over, first out of curiosity. Then he began to think how those rules could have been made more just and equitable.

"Gradually he evolved his ideas of how a draft should be run and with the idea came the conviction that some day in this country there would be the need of a great army and that his army would be raised, not from volunteers, but by a process of selection from the total man power of the country.

"Meanwhile Crowder was advancing in the army step by step.

"When the United States entered the war Gen. Crowder was the one man in the army who was ready to go before congress with a concrete suggestion for the framing of a selective draft law."

Other members of the military committee say Crowder's suggestions were written into the bill almost without change.

SLACKER GOES TO JAIL

Secretary of I. W. W. Given Sentence of a Year.

PORTLAND, July 13.—C. A. Johnson, said to be secretary of a local chapter of the I. W. W. and also an organizer for the same body, was convicted of being a slacker in Judge Wolverson's court yesterday. He was given the maximum punishment provided for this offense when he was sentenced to serve one year in the county jail.

Johnson did not register and when the complaint was filed by Assistant United States Attorney Beckman he claimed that he was 36 years old. In the court he admitted that he was 28 years old. He stated that he did not wish to fight and did not believe in war.

PADDOCK IS IN ITALY

Assignment to Y. M. C. A. Work With Ambulance Drivers Made.

HOOD RIVER, Or., July 12.—(U. P.)—Mrs. F. G. Hutchinson has received a letter from her brother, Bishop R. L. Paddock, of the Eastern Oregon diocese of the Episcopal church, who recently sailed overseas for Y. M. C. A. work, announcing that he has been sent to the Italian front.

So far as is known here, Bishop Paddock, who before he sailed spent several weeks working at Camp Lewis, is the only American chaplain on the Italian front. He had been assigned for duty according to the letter, as chaplain for 200 American ambulance drivers.
