### WILL OBSERVE HOLIDAY.

Tomorrow is Anniversary of Fall Of Bastille.

CAMP LEWIS, Wash., July 13.—All organizations are requested to display the flag of France together with the standard of the United States on their flagstaffs tomorrow Sunday, July 14. Battle day, according to an order put out by Colonel E. N. Jones, camp commander, this morning. Organization commanders are also authorized to grant passes to all Czechoslovak soldiers and those of French nationality, who are not in quarantine that they may attend the celebration in Seattle.

Two men, each ignorant of the other's presence in camp, have illegitimately used the same dependents in applications for exemption in the strangest case which the camp exemption board has had to consider. Both are from Utah. One was divorced a few years ago, his wife gaining possession of two of the four children. Soldier farmers who are wanted to aid in harvesting the eggs, must have 60 days' training here before being given agricultural furloughs, according to a ruling received here by Captain C. R. Peck, in charge of the work. The position taken is that, if the organization to which they are assigned is called for immediate overseas service and the men recalled to camp, they will have had the preliminary training.
