Fairly Heavy Receipts Of Both Cattle And Hogs.

PORTLAND, July 11.—While we had a fairly heavy run of cattle Monday the receipts since have been light, and in consequence the market on all grades is holding steady at quotations.

Prime steers, \$12 to \$13; good to choice steers \$11 to \$12; medium to good steers, \$9 to \$10; fat to medium steers, \$8 to \$9; common to fair steers, \$5 to \$8; choice cows and heifers \$6 to \$7.50; fair to med. cows and heifers \$4.50 to \$5.50; canners, \$3 to \$4.50; bulls \$6 to \$8; calves, \$8.50 to \$11.50; stockers and feeders \$7 to \$11.50.

Hogs—With a fairly heavy run of hogs today, consisting of 1200 head, the market is in a healthy condition, all offerings being cleared up at quotations. Prime mixed \$17 to \$17.50; medium mixed, \$16.75 to \$17.25; rough heavies, \$16 to \$16.50; pigs \$15.75 to \$16.25; bulk \$17 to \$17.25.

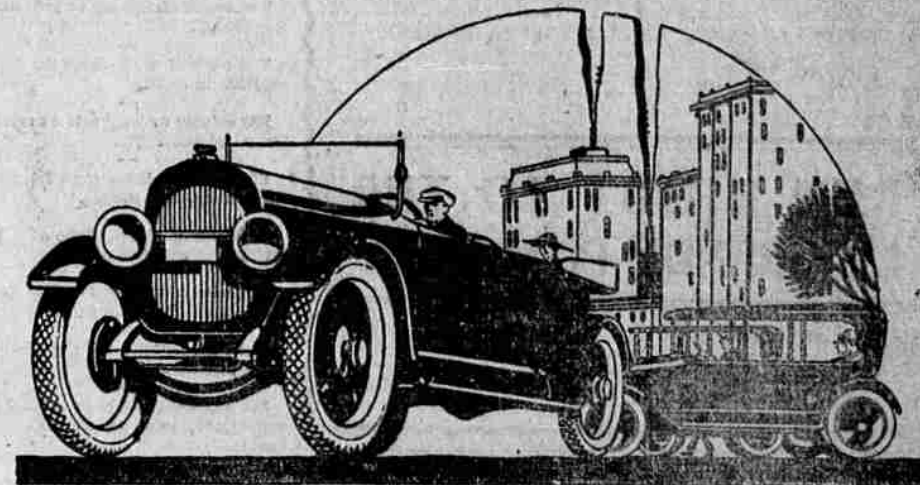
