I should say that there is over 50 per cent difference in the roads in favor of the Toll Gate hill. As to Summerville, there is a great opportunity for reaping benefits from the increasing tourist trade, and a delightful wayside stopping place can be made that will become known to all travelers. 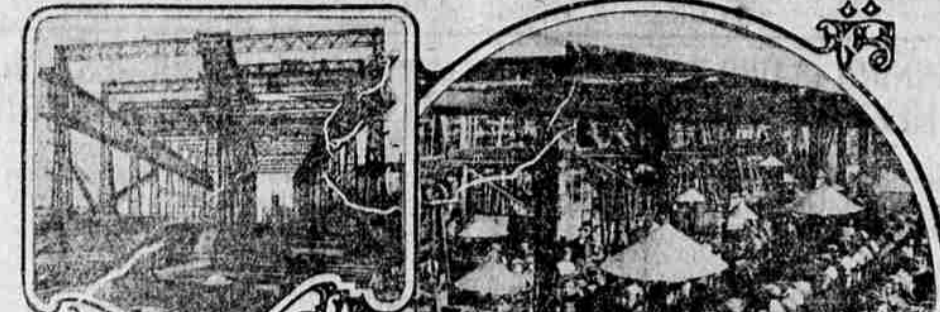
"Overalls and a family crest do not go well together and I want to understand that I am making my living as a shipbuilder, not as a count," he said.

# Organizing for the Victories of Peace

Great Britain has approached her system of commercial reconstruction after the war with an enthusiasm and thoroughness which holds both suggestion and inspiration for the United States.

British reconstructionists take due cognizance of the two periods of post-war activities—the period of readjustment to a new peace basis and the development of business upon that basis. But in the plans of Great Britain's Ministry of Reconstruction these two periods largely overlap.

The idea of British leaders is that if the Empire is to endure there must be such re-orientation of men and industries to such changed circumstances and such restriction of effort as will insure the utmost development of other resources.

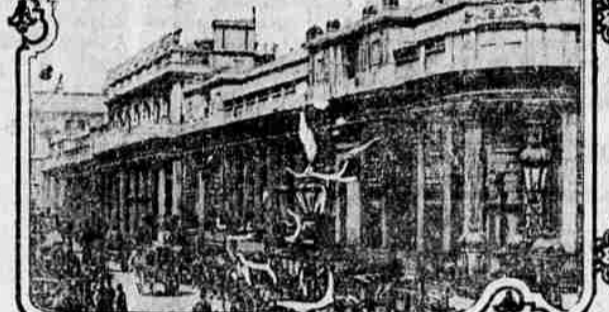
Preparatory to this development, Great Britain is taking what is probably the most remarkable inventory ever attempted. Under the direction of the Ministry of Reconstruction, the Ministry of Munitions, Department of the Foreign Office and Board of Trade and other governmental agencies nearly a hundred committees are collecting information throughout the Empire.

For example, the Prime Minister's committee on Commercial and Industrial Policy is considering what industries are essential to the future safety of the nation and what steps should be taken to maintain and establish them; what should be done to recover home and foreign trade lost during the war and to secure new markets; to what extent and by what means the resources of the Empire should not be developed; to what extent and by what means the sources of supply within the Empire can be protected from failure under foreign control.

Another important committee is the Dominions Royal Commission, which is inquiring into the natural resources and trade possibilities of the five self-governing dominions. Then there is the Financial Facilities Committee, charged with ascertaining whether the normal arrangements for financing trade will be adequate for post-war needs, and, if not, how they should be supplemented. This Commission will also consider the problem of financing the conversion of munitions plants into factories for normal peace pro-

duction. Another important body under the Ministry of Reconstruction is the Central Committee of Materials Supply, which is considering the nature and amount of supplies of material required by the various parts of the Empire during the period of readjustment, as well as the requirements of other nations during that period. Of special interest to Americans is the Indian Cotton Committee, which is studying the cotton market with a view to the development of long staple cottons in India.

In the direction of developing new industries the Engineering Trades Committee is compiling a list of the articles suitable for manufacture, by those with engineering trade experience, which were either not made in the United Kingdom before the war, but were imported, or were made in small or insufficient quantities and for which there is likely to be a considerable demand after the war.

Another important field is the development of mineral resources. The Imperial Mineral Resources Bureau Committee is preparing a scheme for establishing an information bureau in London to study mineral resources and requirements and suggest plans for de-

velopment along this line. The Department of Scientific and Industrial Research has more than a score of committees devoted to the investigation of specific matters such as metallurgy, glass and optical instruments, illumination, abrasives, vitreous compounds, tin, tungsten, lubricants, zinc and copper.

With all these arrangements for increasing the volume and improving the character of the things that can be produced in the British Empire have gone plans for building up a great selling agency.

The British Government is also giving close attention to the possibilities of electrical power.

Naturally the most attention is given to the restoration of the merchant navy.

The British banks are aware of the great demands that will be made upon them to finance this colossal program. They are concentrating on reserves of capital upon which to build an adequate credit structure. These amalgamations are significant of the growing feeling that to win their way, or even to survive, the peoples of the British Empire must draw closer together socially, politically and economically.

## FREE SITE FOR PLANT.

The Method. For instance, the branch factory of the Wittenberg-King Co., only recently located at Salem, is just now completing a contract for \$250,000 worth of dehydrated potatoes, the by-products, such as the peels being sold at a profit as hog feed, while the cells are going into the new starch factory, so that besides being able to make a fair profit on its government contract, a small profit is made on what would ordinarily be called waste.

As it takes just an even 20 per cent of spuds, as they come from the ground to make 3 1/2 tons of dehydrated product, it can easily be seen that, when it comes to the shipping of these concentrated food products across the continent it requires only one car to what would require twelve, if the spuds were shipped green, besides the terrible loss in transit would be more than offset any small extra cost of dehydrating the potatoes. As cars from now on will be cars, when it comes to laying in the winter's immense thing for the government, as well as the farmers of these valleys it would be to have a large plant like this located right here in La Grande.

These were only a few of the arguments which induced Mr. McKennon to make his offer of a free building site for such a company to locate in La Grande.

It was intimated by Mr. Buckley when he was here that there would be little difficulty in arranging for a suitable site for such a factory.

Continuing in his enthusiastic manner yesterday, Mr. McKennon said, in part:
