PICTURES THE SHOT THAT CAUSED THE GREAT WAR

The shot that rang around the world—the murder of the Archduke of Austria—never was more vividly reproduced than in "Fields of Honor," the Goldwyn pictorialization of Irvin S. Cobb's stirring story, starring wistful Mae Marsh.

For realism and fidelity to detail, the scene portraying the assassination of Francis Ferdinand at Sarajevo, Bosnia, has never been approached. So realistic is the screen version of the tragedy that one is forced to doubt whether it could be more so had a photographer clicked the actual killing—the event that transformed a peaceful world into a bloody battleground.

The archduke is seen chatting and laughing in his automobile with his aides, seemingly at peace with all the world. Hundreds of Bosnians are depicted flocking around the vehicle, the majority of them undecided whether to

Men, women and children are seen lifting their hands and bowing their heads in prayer as physicians wave them back from the automobile to restore quiet while everything is being done to assuage the suffering of the royal victim.

## PLEASED WITH MARINE CORPS

LOCAL BOYS SEND GOOD REPORTS FROM MARE ISLAND.

Sergeant Henry in Receipt of Orders For Telegraphers and Others For Skilled Service.

"The scope and functions of the Marine Corps, as a branch of our fighting machine, is the least understood branch of all our war units," said Sergeant Henry, this morning.

"For instance," he continued, here is a bulletin I have just received from Second Lt. H. E. Potter, the district manager for Oregon. He wants us to give it all the publicity we can:

"We are in need of telegraph men and linemen, and they can enlist for duty with the Signal Battalion and will be transferred to Philadelphia for a special technical course."

As indicating the kind of war work the Marine Corps is doing, the sergeant handed over a bunch of letters from men already in the service, which tell a part of the story:

From Glen R. Conkey.  
Mare Island, Calif., June 12, 1918.  
To Sergeant L. H. Henry, Marine Recruiting Station, La Grande, Oregon.  
Dear Sir: When in La Grande, I remember saying that you would expect a letter from Portland, but due to the short time here, I decided to wait until coming to Mare Island. So, this evening I shall carry out that decision and write a few lines to you. Mr. Prescott had no trouble in passing the physical examination at the recruiting station in Portland. He is slightly heavy for his height, but doesn't suffer several weeks' training will be able to keep pace with most any of the boys.

At the present time we are in the detention camp, Prescott in Company C and myself in Company A. I have a fine room-mate by the name of Mr. Holt. He is also an Oregon man and previously a student at Stanford.

More letters comes up to every expectation. I have already become acquainted with the climate here on Friday. I like the service fine, and am glad to be one of the boys. Everything is just as I had been represented to me, and I am satisfied with the choice I have made.

Now, Sergeant, I want to thank you for your kind advice and help while in La Grande. This year is going to be a big factor in my life, and I shall

be able to look back after the war is over and remember the boys of the Marine Corps as my friends.

From Clarence E. Redhead.  
Marine Barracks, Mare Island, California, June 9, 1918.

Sergeant Henry, dear friend: In regard to your request to write to you, I will state that I passed the exams very nicely, and that I have been treated fine, fair and square. I was sworn in Thursday the 6th, and was fitted out with uniform, etc., the following morning. We were given a few instructions yesterday, but we will get down to business tomorrow. There were nine of us from Portland here, all fine fellows, and we are still together. I understand that we are here for a nine weeks' training period, and then are sent elsewhere for special training. We are under Sgt. Wolf. He knows you well. I have not learned our corporal's name. I think I will get along fine and intend to pay strict attention to what I am told to do. We are quartered in tents, Second Section, Company C. If there are any questions I can answer for you I will gladly do it.

I met Conkey and the other La Grande boys here. Have you any record of Louie Iverson. I think he enlisted about a month ago, and I would like to find him. I will add that I am very glad that I enlisted in the Marines.

Sgt. James L. Henry, U. S. Marine Recruiting Office, La Grande, Oregon.

Dear Sir: We arrived here safely and are very comfortably quartered in the applicants' barracks. We got here Thursday a. m. at 8, and of course have been very busy since then, had our preliminary examination on Friday, and finals today, and would probably have been sworn in this afternoon had it not been Saturday afternoon, so we will get that and our first shot Monday.

I passed in all the tests and I want to tell you I'm tickled to death, and certainly wish to thank you for your friendly advice and help. From my first impressions and observations, I am satisfied that the U. S. M. C. is the best of all, and it is plain to see why they are doing such brilliant work in France. Conkey is also very much pleased and I know we will both like it. I have seen several of the other boys whom you sent, and every one is glad that he is a Marine. Of course we aren't real Marines, until

we get turned over, but we have the determination and are willing to take all they give us.

"Chow" is great, the only thing that has been worrying me is that they will feed us up too much before we get down to work and you know I can't stand very much more, and I have had a ravenous appetite ever since I have been here. For dinner today we had bread (white), butter, potatoes, meat, gravy, soup, asparagus, and ribs. There is certainly no danger of anyone being under-fed here.

Well, I will close, and want to thank you again for your assistance and patience with me during my numerous visits to your office.
