CAMP CONSERVATION.

Fish Is Urged As A Substitute For Meat.

Fish for food as well as for pleasure, suggests the United States Food Administration to the thousands of families who spend several weeks every summer in camps on lakes and streams. Fish as a substitute for meat has long been urged, and now that the shortage of beef is again serious it is desirable to increase the use of fish.

Fishing has an added charm when one's dinner depends on the catch, and the sport of camp cookery should be more attractive in a game to see how many delicious ways the fresh catch can be prepared for the table.

Besides fried, baked and stuffed fish, there are other means of preparation which adapt themselves readily to camp kitchens.

Fish Chowder.
2 lbs. fish.
4 tablespoons drippings.
1 medium onion, chopped fine.
1 quart sliced potatoes.
2 cups hot milk.
Skin and bone the fish and cut into inch cubes. Cover the water and trimmings with cold water and let simmer for one-half hour. Cook

the onion in the fat for five minutes in a stew pan.
Parboil the sliced potatoes for five minutes, then drain and add layers of fish and potatoes to the fat and onion in the stew pan. Season each layer with salt and pepper. Strain the liquid in which the fish bones have been boiling over all, and cook about twenty minutes until fish and potatoes are tender. Then add the scalded milk. If desired thicker, sprinkle a little corn meal between each layer of fish and potatoes.

"THE GODS OF FATE."

The most expensive single scene ever photographed for use in a motion picture is the railroad wreck, which forms one of the principal incidents in the Lubin Manufacturing Company's five-reel feature entitled "The Gods of Fate." In this scene, two trains, one a passenger, consisting of an engine and five coaches and the other, a freight train made up of an engine and six freight cars, meet in a head-on collision, while running at the rate of 45 miles an hour. This scene was staged outside Altoona, Pennsylvania, and cost the Lubin Manufacturing Company over \$25,000.

In the making of this picture, the services of fifteen cameramen were employed, and at the moment of the actual crash, they were within twelve feet of the explosion. In order to protect themselves from clouds of steam and flying debris, it was necessary for them to work behind armor plate shields similar to those used by the United States Artillery.

What Makes the Rumble of Thunder?

Why does thunder rumble? The path of a lightning flash through the air may be several miles in length. All along this path the sudden expansion of the heated air—a true explosion—sets up an atmospheric wave which sprays in all directions and eventually registers upon our ears as thunder. Since the lightning discharge is almost instantaneous, the sound wave is produced at very nearly the same time along the whole path. But the sound wave travels slowly through the air. Its speed is approximately 1,000 feet per second, thus the sound from the part of the lightning's path that is nearest to us reaches us first, and that from other parts of the path afterward, according to their distance. Intermitting flashes and booming effects are due chiefly to irregularities in the shape of the path.—Popular Science Monthly.
