### DR. PHY MAKES RECORD AS A TRAP SHOOTER

WEEKLY CONTESTS GREAT EVENT AT SANATORIUM—LADD CANYON BUNGALOW—MR. WINDUS CALLED TO MONTANA.

HOT LAKE, July 19.—(Special.)—The third "leg" of the Hot Lake trophy, a silver cup, was shot for this afternoon. The members of the shoot comprise Lon Rayburn, Dr. Phy, Joe Carr (Old Blue Rock), Frank Lilley, Larison and T. J. Scroggin. The event is a handicap shoot, each contestant shooting at 100 clay pigeons. "Kills," added to handicap points decide in the aggregate the winner of each "leg." The contestant winning three legs being the winner of the trophy.

The first shoot, two weeks ago, was won by Lou Rayburn with 97 kills, added to a handicap of 5, making high score of 101 for that day. Last week, Dr. Phy was high gun with 95 kills and handicap of 8. Today Dr. Phy won with a total of 105 points, the highest total yet shot during the contest.

The weekly shoot is enjoyed immensely by the trap men and a very interested crowd of guests of the Sanatorium.

### THRILLS AT THE FRONT

Girl Who Makes Doughnuts, Entertained By Aviator.

WITH THE AMERICAN BOYS AT THE FRONT, June 17.—(By Mail.)—Thrills out here at the front come from the most unexpected places.

When there is no excitement in one place it usually comes from another. A most interesting thing happened a few days ago. One of our aviators came very low over the town and caused much excitement. We all rushed out as soon as we heard the roar of his motor, for we thought possibly he had been brought down. One of the American machines did crash just outside of town, some time ago.

But this tiny little machine whizzed over the roofs and went away, evidently not bothered by the German "archers," which always shoot when American aeroplanes get in sight. We went to work again, forgetting the incident.

About twenty minutes later a very tired and dusty aviator walked into our kitchen and asked for "doughnuts made by the doughgirls for doughboys." He said he was not a doughboy, but he had not eaten doughnuts for a year, since he left home.

Fortunately we had some extra doughnuts that day, so we brought out a pan of them. We were delighted to feed them to an aviator, and espec-

ially a fighting pilot. He ate several and then asked for our doughnut recipe, saying the cook of the escadrille might be able to make doughnuts.

He had heard of our doughnuts and after locating our village from above, had alighted in a field on the outskirts, just out of sight of enemy observation balloons. From there he walked to our hut.

We were tickled to death when he promised to come back the following day and do stunts over our hut. We gave him a batch of doughnuts to take back to his pals, via airplane.

Sure enough the next morning along came our aviator man. He turned somersaults and flips of many kinds to our delight. Doughboys from every place gathered and watched our birdman friends, and were almost crazy with joy at his stunts.

Finally the little airplane darted off and up. We had just about decided the show was over when back he came diving very suddenly until he was only about three hundred feet from us.

Then he straightened out and circled around once turning way over on the battleship Rochester, which is his hand to us. We surely were excited for fear he would crash into something, and thrilled with his skill.

Suddenly he went away like a streak, and very soon afterwards we saw him higher and nearer the lines.

Back of him was a string of little black puffs, and we knew the Germans were shooting at him. "But they did not get him, for he has been back
