SENSATION IN CANNED GOODS

GOVERNMENT RESERVES 65 PER CENT SALMON PACK.

General Public Will Be Without Salmon Until The 1919 Pack Is Available.

Somewhat of a sensation has just been created in the canned goods trade circles by the receipt of telegrams from Washington asking packers to reserve of the total 1918 salmon pack 65 per cent each of Red Sockeyes, Medium Reds, Pinks, Sockeyes and Chums. This information, coming in what is expected to be a short year, means the public will have to go without salmon before the 1919 pack becomes available, as the needs of the army are imperative, especially with the tremendous increase in its forces contemplated, and for which ample provision for feeding must be made.

Oozing Fountain Pens.

An application of heavy oil to the joints of a fountain pen will effectively overcome the oozing out of ink at these places, says Popular Mechanics Magazine. The types of fountain pens, having points which disappear by turning a section of the barrel, sometimes leak because of wear. To remedy this, soak the pen in warm water and permit to dry, particularly inside. Then apply oil on the spherule that is revolved. Heavy cylinder oil is the best for the purpose. The lubricant should be worked through the bearing from end to end. The pen is then refilled and excess oil wiped off.

Freak Newspapers

Freak newspapers have afforded a good deal of entertainment in their day. One of the most remarkable was the Luminara, published some years ago in Madrid. It was printed with ink containing phosphorus, so that the paper could be read in the dark. An entirely unique production was the Regal. This journal was printed with non-poisonous ink on thin sheets of dough, which, after being carefully perused, could be eaten, thus furnishing nourishment for body as well as mind.

PHILIP H. GADSDEN



Philip H. Gadsden, chairman of the national committee on public utilities conditions, has opened offices in Washington for the purpose of organizing United States public utilities in the field of the light and power companies, the street railway companies and the gas companies so that they may co-ordinate all their resources toward winning the war. WAR GARDEN EXPERT

Ex-Councilman Moulton Of Baker Has System Of His Own.

War gardening, as a science, is now occupying the time of G. B. Moulton, of Baker, whose acre tract of ground, is attracting much attention.

His system of irrigation is somewhat peculiar, as an experiment.

In his large garden there are rows of corn, potatoes cover almost a quarter of an acre, while there are tomato plants, cucumber vines, squash, beets, peas and a row of peanuts, as an experiment.

Mr. Moulton raised peanuts successfully on his place on the banks of the Snake river, just north of Huntington, on land peculiarly adapted to their growth, being on a sunny slope down to the river. Besides that advantage the climate all along the Snake river is much warmer nights, than in Baker. If these vines planted in Baker bear a crop, Mr. Moulton, says he will plant more next year.

The secret of Mr. Moulton's success with his garden this year, lies in 200 feet of canvas hose, and that is not all, careful cultivation with a new device in the way of hand cultivators, which Mr. Moulton says enables him to do as much work in half a day as he could possibly do with hoe in three days.

A deep sunk well on his ground, from which water is pumped by 1 1/2 h.p. gasoline engine, throws the water through this canvas hose No. 12, of about 3 inches in diameter—the hose being laid, for instance, down through one row of corn, and back through the next, allows the water to soak slowly into the ground, and it stays where it is put, and most needed.

"I find this method of irrigation even better than rain itself, because I can regulate the flow just as I desire, and when I shut off the water from entering the hose, what is then left in it gradually seeps into the ground, and I do not have to irrigate every day, as would be

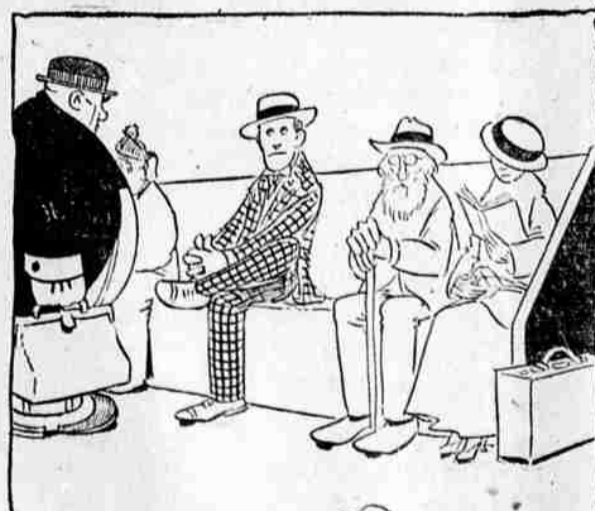
