OREGON MUST SAVE BABIES

QUOTA FOR STATE IS 566 FOR ENSUING YEAR.

Tomorrow Is The Day When Weighing And Measuring Is Done.

Many of the physical defects which caused the rejection of one-third of the men coming up for examination in the first draft are believed to date from some slight trouble neglected in early childhood. The Children's Bureau emphasizes the fact that a higher standard of physical fitness in the rising generation can be assured only by greater attention to the physical condition of children.

The response to the call for weighing and measuring children is beyond expectation but the committee hopes to have every child in La Grande included in this test.

Remember the time for this test is Thursday, July 25, 10 to 12 a.m. and 2 to 4 p.m. at Riviera School, Mrs. Garner, chairman; Greenwood School, Mrs. H. S. Brownson, chairman; Central School, Mrs. L. B. Moe, chairman. Children included in this test are from six months to six years of age.

This test is the first step in a larger war-time program. The test will be followed by some permanent work for the protection of mother's babies and young children.

The safeguarding and protection of children is looked upon as a patriotic duty in view of the unavoidable wastage of human life incident to war. The hearty co-operation of every person in La Grande is requested for this date, Thursday, July 25.

Many of the physicians, nurses and ladies are giving their assistance in this work.

BACK FROM CALGARY

W. B. Sargent Reports Poor Crops in Canadian Country.

"I had my first piece of white bread while I was in Calgary Province, Canada, on my recent visit there," said W. B. Sargent, who only recently returned from a 10 days' business trip to the Province of Calgary, Canada. "So, you see that as far as white bread is concerned during the war, we here in the United States are worse off than our Canadian neighbors to the north.

Total Crop Failure.
"There will be almost a total failure of all grain crops in that province, so I was informed by government officials. Their statistics show that there were put under cultivation in that district 2,600,000 acres of wheat, and other grains, in the South Alberta district, and out of that vast acreage there will be harvested less than 8,000,000 bushels, while in normal years there would be harvested more than ten times that number of bushels. The extreme dry weather drough-burned the crops.

"I spent ten days in the Calgary district, and while there traveled all over it, making inquiries in all directions, and was told that the Saskatchewan district is in just as bad condition, as far as crops are concerned. "The government of Canada will surely have to help these people out. An attempt was being made while I was there, to raise \$1,000,000 for the Y. M. C. A. war fund of that country, but owing to crop failures, they will have difficulty in doing it.

"The Canadian government is also making arrangements to float another big 'Victory Loan,' in which the United States in previous years has taken a hand. This time, however, the government has informed the people of Canada that Americans have all they can do to take care of their own war loans, and they must take care of their own loans.

"I made my trip to Canada by way of Spokane, and all the way between here and Canada I did not see any crops that could compare with the crops right here in the Grande Ronde valley."
