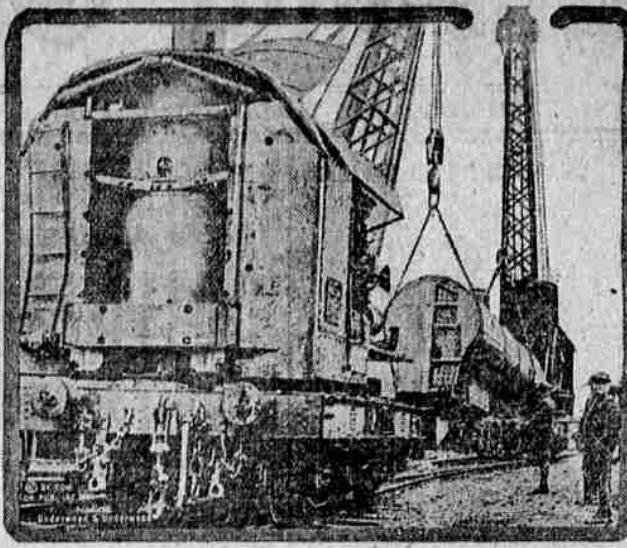

The Red Cross shop and salvage bureau has taken in during the past month \$300.65 from salvage, donations in the shop, rummage sale and cooked food sales. Last, but not least, \$17.10 was netted from a box of candy donated by Mr. H. J. Ritter.

The ladies working in the shop, under the direction of Mrs. T. N. Murphy, are Mesdames W. H. Talbot, M. K. Hall, R. F. Halthapp, J. Theisen, R. M. Healey, E. Seelig, T. J. Scroggin, W. Parker, Delle Green, G. L. Higgins, J. C. Gulling and Misses Foley and Ryan.

The following committees have been added: Cooked food sales, Mrs. J. C. Gulling; fancy work or all kinds, including kitchen aprons and baby layettes, Mrs. T. J. Scroggin and Mrs. M. G. L. Larson; rummage sales, Mesdames L. Givon, F. Jackson, and Thos. Hudger. Last week's rummage sale netted \$40.70. The cooked food sale given by the Eastern Star Chapter netted \$80.00, and by the Kaffee Kitch, \$17.62.

Donations Needed.

The shop is in need of donations of all kinds, such as knitting bags, caps, aprons, baby layettes, clothing—in fact anything will be acceptable. If you will only bring articles to the shop the ladies will do their best to sell them. They are giving their time for that purpose.

The shop is about sold in the salvage department, so it is urged that everyone look into their wood sheds, attics, basements and trunks for articles that have been stowed away and which are of no special value to the owners, but mean so much to the Red Cross shop and salvage bureau. The Red Cross salvage bureau, under the management of the Red Cross shop, wants all kinds of junk and waste material. Everything has value. Especially desired—Tin or lead foil, folded flat. Do not roll. All metals copper, brass, iron, zinc, aluminum cast iron junk, rubber junk of all kinds, old motor tires and tubes, bicycle tires; burlap and gunny sacks, string rolled into balls, cotton and hemp (separate); clean white rags, woolen rags (separated), mixed rags, old clothes, old shoes, old kid gloves; fruit jars, cold cream jars, bottles of all kinds (cleaned); collapsible paste and paint tubes, wafer tins, corks, typewriter ribbon boxes and spools, carbon paper boxes, medicine bottles.

At present there is for sale: One Taylor baby bed, two baby buggies (new), two bed quilts (new), one go-cart, one doll buggy, one dress form, new lot of men's and boys' hats 25 cents each, pieces for making quilts books of all descriptions.

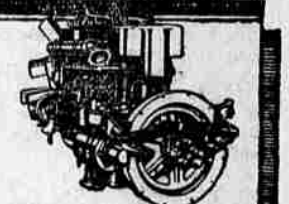

flushing. Have had the rocks raked off of C Street and the road connecting with the county road through Mill canyon leveled up and the high centers taken out.

Water Pipes Full Capacity.

Have visited the Beaver Creek reservoir again since last report and found it necessary to treat the water again. So far we have been successful with the application of blue vitriol and at this time the water is in good condition. We still have sufficient water in the reservoir to take us through the summer without pumping from the river. We are able to keep the growth of algae from getting ahead of us. I rode over the pipe line along its entire length and found there was but one leak and that one of minor importance. This has since been repaired. The telephone line needs some attention to insure service through the winter and this will be taken care of in time to prevent interruption when the snow falls. At present it is giving good service. Have let the water out of the City reservoir and will have same thoroughly washed as soon as it is completely drained. At the present rate of consumption the Beaver Creek pipe line is just able to deliver the water consumed and keep the proper pressure up. So far we have not pumped any water from the river, but should the consumption of water be increased to any great extent we could not deliver sufficient water through the pipes. There is sufficient water in the reservoir for all purposes. The trouble does not lie there, but it is simply a matter of being able to deliver it to the city reservoir.

Are you prepared to handle your grain in bulk? Do not wait until Spring and Summer when you are buried with work and worried with labor shortage, but build your granaries now.

You can buy the lumber and roofing paper for a first-class 1000 bushel portable granary for \$54.58 and it will last for years. Sacks for the same amount of grain will cost you \$125.00 and this would be a dead loss against this year's crop.

A granary of this size can be moved anywhere and can be filled directly from the thresher, doing away with high priced labor handling and sewing sacks.

The boys in the trenches need the sacks for sand bags for the protection of their very lives and perhaps your boy is among them.

Spend your money in your own valley by buying lumber manufactured at home. When you buy sacks part of the money goes to India.

BUILD YOUR GRANARIES NOW

Be prepared by building them before the farming season opens up. Be sure to get good lumber, well seasoned, as low grade lumber will give you trouble in a few seasons. Don't use green lumber.

Save money—keep what you spend at home—prevent loss and damage from exposure to weather—leave the sacks for our boys in the trenches; help win the war by building granaries now.
