HOP RAISING OUT OF STYLE

T. H. REECE, HOP BUYER OF
PORTLAND, GIVES FIGURES.

From Over 100,000 Bales Two
Years Ago, Oregon Will Pro-
duce Less Than 10,000.

"I have been buying hops in the state of Oregon now going on a period of 33 years, and this year there will be the smallest crop in my experience," said T. H. Reece of Portland, the well-known hop dealer.

"Two years ago upwards of 13,000 acres of hop yards were plowed up, and put to other crops. This includes the celebrated 600 of the Horst Bros., situated in Polk county, just across the Willamette river from Salem. Here they have planted the biggest war garden in the state, where there are all kinds of vegetables and have installed their own evaporator.

"Two years ago there were produced in Oregon hop yards upwards of 160,000 bales, while this year there will be produced less than 10,000 bales. There is no foreign market any longer, owing to the war, and hops can only be sold in eastern states.

"Thirty odd years ago New York state produced alone upwards of 200,000 bales, while I am credibly informed, this year's crop will be less than 10,000 bales.

In my opinion the time is coming when the entire United States will be "dry."

Don't Always Blame the Telephone Operator When You Are Called By Mistake

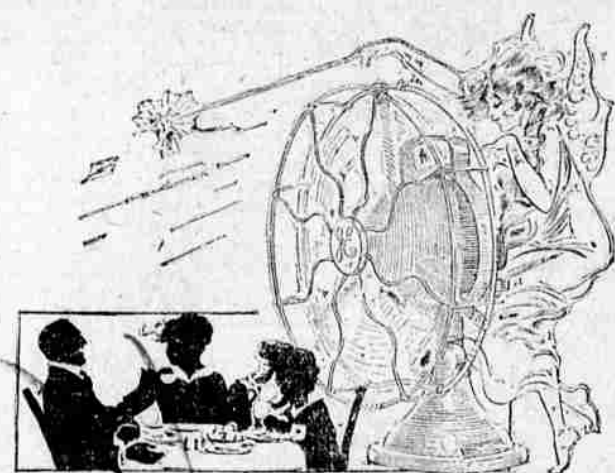
Were you ever called to the telephone when another number was wanted?
