CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

Submitted At Commissioners' Meeting
On Wednesday Evening,
July 31, 1918.

To the Honorable Commission,
City of La Grande, Oregon.

Gentlemen:
The Fire Chief reports one fire for the week. This was the fire which consumed the house opposite the City Park. The house and contents were a total loss, the fire having secured such headway before the department was able to reach it that it was only by specially hard work that the adjoining buildings were saved. Insurance on building \$1500. Furniture had contents nothing. Twelve firemen answered the call. Total cost to the department \$18. Truck driver Combs having resigned, Harold Taal has been advanced to his position and L. R. Wood has been appointed to the place made vacant by Taal's promotion.

The Chief of Police reports four arrests for the week. Three traffic violations and one cigarette smoker. Number of stock impounded five. Receipts from pound, \$32.50.

The street and water department foreman reports a total expenditure for labor for the two departments at \$99. This does not include the cost of reading meters. The foreman is doing this himself. The crossing at North Second and 2 Ave. has been replaced. C Street has been raked free from small rock and much of the large rock taken away. Some of the exceptionally large boulders will have to be covered up. The road to connect with the Mill creek county road has been repaired. A street has received some attention, but in order to make this street passable in the winter a bridge should be erected at the junction of the County road and B Street. The bridge on C street should also be enlarged in order to give it sufficient capacity to handle the flood water in the winter. The road to Beaver creek has been cleared of loose rock and the telephone line repaired in most of the places where repairs are necessary. The water situation is the same as per last report. There is sufficient water in the reservoir to carry us through the hot months, and so far there is no indication that the water will go bad. At least we have been able to hold it good up to date.

We have an extra man patrolling the Beaver Creek watershed as per request of the Forest Supervisor, working under the personal direction of the Forest Ranger. The government has two men working with our men, and so far no fire of any consequence have been allowed to start.

Have sent for samples of new motor and price list of the style now in use. In order to meter those who are now paying a flat rate it will require about forty meters and am trying to get the possible price on this quantity. Again in view of the fact that at this time every available man capable of doing actual labor should be in the harvest field, have not made any great effort to make the necessary changes. Will have the new meters in a few weeks and by that time the greatest necessity for labor will be over and we can secure sufficient help. We are now running the street and water departments short-handed and expect to continue to do so until after harvest.

All the owners and renters occupying the property recently sold by the city have been notified by the Chief of Police that they are to pay rent to the City and the City Attorney has been asked to proceed with the proper legal action to make the collections. Some

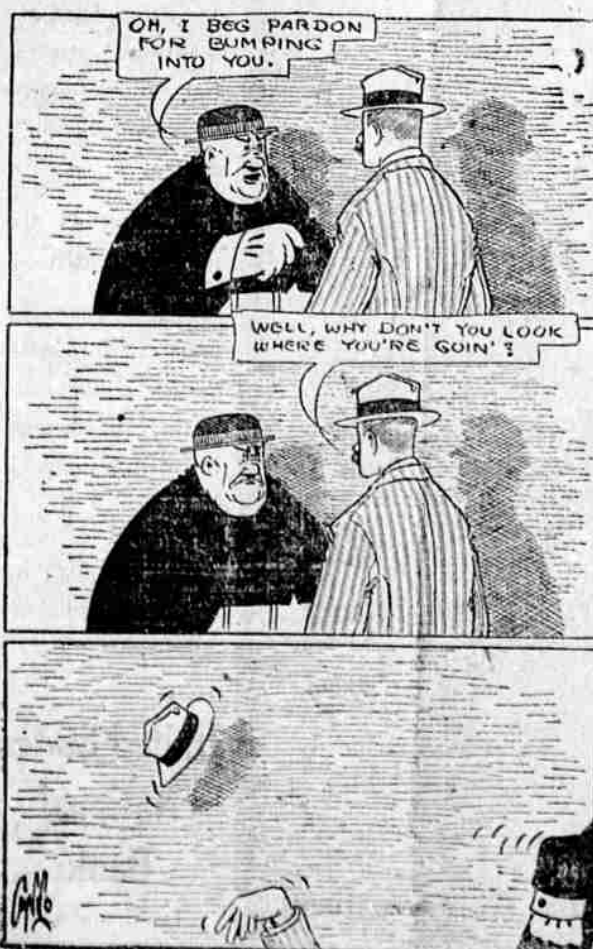

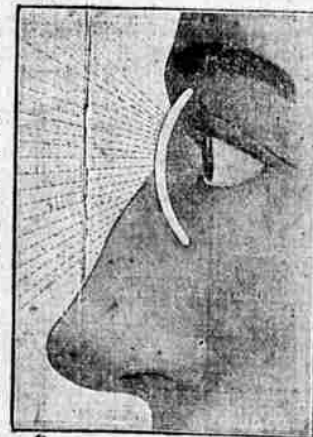
