If no packer profits had been earned, you could have bought your meat at only a fraction of a cent per pound cheaper?

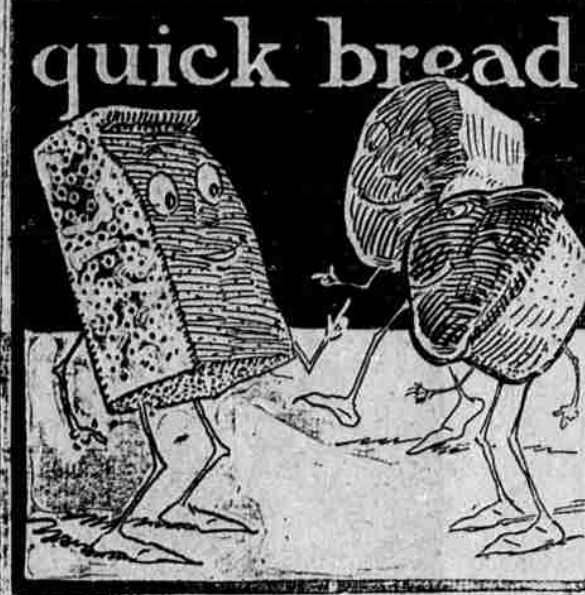
Packers' profits on meats and animal products have been limited by the Food Administration, since November 1, 1917.

CAUSE OF THE UPRISING. DECEASED SOLDIER RECALLED

Interference of Mirbach Was at the Trouble.
By JOSEPH SHAFLEN (United Press Staff Correspondent.) STOCKHOLM, Aug. 8.—Mirbach, the German ambassador who recently was mysteriously murdered, precipitated the Czechoslovak uprising which is adding one more chapter to Russia's bloody revolutionary history.
From the most direct sources I have learned the real story, now told for the first time in America, of the cause of this uprising.
Mirbach, as Germany's representative, demanded that the Soviets at Pensa not only disarm, but imprison, the Czechoslovaks.
The Czechoslovaks sent a delegation to the local soviet chairman, Kurayoff, protesting against such action. Kurayoff insisted that the order be carried out, whereupon the Czechoslovak with their bare hands literally wiped out the local Bolsheviks and Red Guards.
Then the Czechoslovaks called a meeting of representatives of all democratic and socialist parties, reported on the action they had taken, and showed documents proving Mirbach's participation in the plot against the Czechoslovaks.
The meeting closed with the Czechoslovaks' promise to leave the city, which they did, taking arms and ammunition. Bolshevik reinforcements arrived the next day, and proclaimed an alleged defeat of the Czechoslovak force. Repression were increased among the local population.
All Bolsheviks talk about a desire on the part of the Czechoslovaks for a counter revolution is but an arrogant lie. These people have no desire to interfere with the internal situation in Russia, and resorted to violence only when maddened by the contemptible bolshevik surrender to Mirbach's demand.

Mid-Week Pictorial Publishes Picture of La Grande Soldier.
The current issue of the Mid-Week Pictorial, an illustrated magazine printed in New York, prints in its Roll of Honor, a picture of John Hokanson, of La Grande, who died for his country, in France some weeks ago. The likeness is a very good one, and but one fault is to be found, and that is that the paper claims he came from Portland, Hokanson before joining up was wire man for the Western Union in this city.
