LOSES POUND OF FLESH DAILY TO EXIST

PERFECT IRRIGATION PROJECT.

ECHO, Aug. 13.—Permanent organization of the Umatilla River Irrigation district was perfected here recently, officers elected, bylaws adopted and an executive board of 20 members selected from the different districts interested.

At present in the part of Umatilla county known as the west end, some 40,000 acres are under cultivation in the different projects completed. The results have been such as to take the matter of irrigation in that section out of the experimental stage, and now the question is to secure water for fully 100,000 additional acres of equally good land as that under water now. This is the objective of the organization perfected here.

It was unanimously voted the department of the interior would be petitioned immediately to make an accurate survey of all practicable reservoir sites upon the Umatilla watershed.

The officers elected are: President, E. P. Dodd, Hermiston; vice-president, O. D. Teel, Echo; secretary and treasurer, R. A. Holte, Stanfield.

NO SUGAR FOR BEES.

Sugar for feeding bees will be extremely hard to get this year, due to the Federal food control measures.

"Oregon beekeepers generally rob their bees rather closely in the fall," says A. L. Lovett, entomologist of O. A. C., "trusting to the bees to collect from scattered sources sufficient honey to winter them. When this supply fails the bees must depend upon feeding sugar for winter storage or to bring the bees through in the spring. Every effort was made last spring to supply the extra sugar, but food administrators are averse to making any further allowance for this purpose. Beekeepers are urged to allow sufficient honey for winter care of the bees. This not only saves sugar but insures that the bees will winter well and be in a condition to reap the greatest benefit from next year's honey flow."

That is because candy supplies a normal craving for something sweet to supply the bodily need for carbohydrates (fuel for the system). That's why candy is becoming recognized as a food instead of just a luxury. It happens to be the way in which most people like best to supply their system with the fuel it needs.

In normal times the candy industry uses only 8 per cent of the sugar used per capita in this country. Right now this amount has been cut squarely in two.
