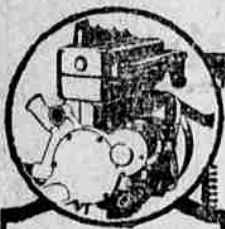

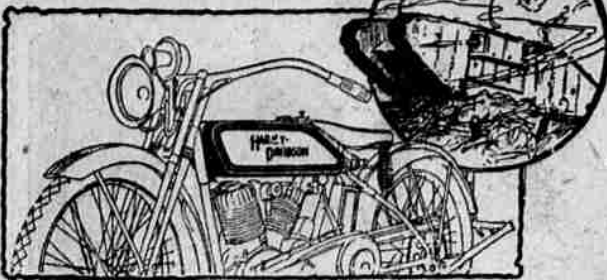

Where the "Tank" Got Its Name



Everyone is familiar with the tank, the mammoth war machine originated by the British, but now in use by all the armies on the western front, but few except those on the "inside" know how these powerful machines of destruction got their name.

When the tanks were first turned loose by the British in their famous offensive the British war department picked as most logical drivers for the tanks, the motorcycle drivers—the dispatch

plied, comes an interesting item from the children of the L. D. S. church. Under the leadership of Mrs. George Stoddard these children have gone out and gathered the bits of wool from off fences and brush. This has been secured and now the Red Cross chapter is asking for some one to card and spin the wool. In the meantime who can beat this bit of conservation? In every case where the children gathered the wool, they first asked the consent of the owners. In some cases they were refused, as the owner wanted to gather it themselves, probably to turn into the same supply.

Knitters, attention. Do not be disturbed too much by the newspapers in regard to yarn. The chapter will this week receive a big shipment of yarn, enough to keep knitters busy for many weeks. By that time the government will release to the Red Cross a limited quantity of yarn.

SALVATION ARMY DRIVE NEXT MONTH

Plans are being rapidly perfected for the Oregon state Salvation Army War Service drive outside of Portland, for \$25,000, which opens all over the state, Sunday, September 15, and closes Saturday, September 21. Evangelist John M. Linden, of Chicago, campaign manager, announces three district campaign assistants, Prof. E. S. Hammond, of the Kimball School of Theology of Salem, who will be in charge of the counties of Western Oregon, and Mr. and Mrs. William S. Dixon, who will supervise the collection of all funds in the counties of central and Eastern Oregon, with headquarters in Pendleton. The general office for the drive has already been opened in Room 228 Chamber of Commerce Building, Portland, with Dr. William Wallace Youngs, general; O. C. Bortz, office manager, and William M. Ladd, treasurer.

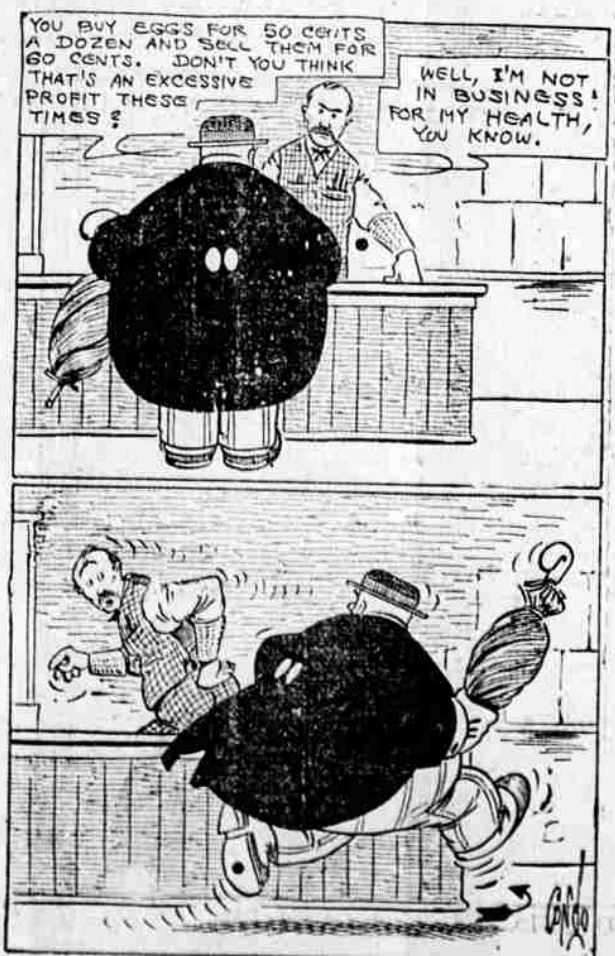
Already the widest publicity has been given the drive through the columns of the press, both city and country.
