With the Colors

The following is an extract from a letter written by Lieut. J. L. Ingle to his mother on the eve of his departure for France:

"The papers are full of the reports of the death of Quentin Roosevelt. To me the news means more than the death of a Roosevelt. It means the death of the son of a former president of our country; a president who has given all of his sons and who is doing all he can himself to help in this great cause. One son is dead, two others are at present in military hospitals recovering from wounds, and the fourth is fighting at the front.

"Instead of getting safe, easy jobs, as commissioned clerk warriors, which they might have had, all four went into the real fighting at the front—into the smoking, tearing, roaring front lines. No shirking of danger for them, but in an amazing way they are doing their part—worthy sons of a great American.

"Think of the impression such sacrifices must have upon our European allies. It is surely a proof to them that we are in this war to our last man and that we are in to win.

"When I think of the sacrifices of our leaders and then think of the Kaiser and his seven sons, all bedecked with medals of valor, and not one of them having been close enough to the front to smell powder, I'm more certain than ever that we must do away with him and his tribe and establish a new state of mind in Germany. But, before we succeed, many of us will go as our ex-president's son has gone. We will go willingly. I find among all the young officers I meet here, a quiet determination to do their share—a desire to accomplish something that will actually contribute to the winning of the war.

"I have read Roosevelt's statement several times, and I think it is the attitude that all parents should take. 'Quentin's mother and I are very glad that he got to the front and had the chance to render some service to his country, and to show the stuff that was in him before his fate befell him.'

"I am enjoying my stay in New York. I am staying at the home of the former Secretary of War, Col. Lament, which has been turned over to officers on their way to the front. It is called the junior officers' home, and is located on Fifth Avenue. In-

stead of the usual cold disinterestedness of the people of a large city, I find everyone trying to do something for me. The clerks in the stores, the conductors, the civilians, and everyone are trying to do something for the men in uniform. I have my travel orders, but I can not tell even you when I am going. However, I can tell you this, when you read this letter I will be well on my way to France."

LOOK TO OREGON FOR WAR WORKERS

Many States Have Been Provided With Demonstration Agents By O. A. C.

CORVALLIS, Aug. 17.—Requests for home demonstration agents or extension workers have been received at the Oregon Agricultural College from Wyoming, New Mexico, Iowa, Kansas, Colorado, Massachusetts, Delaware, and Cornell University and many women with special training have already been placed by the college. Many persons have already been placed.

To meet the increased demand for training for home demonstration and other important war work particularly in the field of food conservation, the college is arranging a course for the next school year. It is expected that most of those who take this work will be graduates of the college or other institutions. The work will include such subjects as advanced nutrition, household administration, industrial journalism, home nursing and invalid cookery and rural sociology.
