WET WEATHER IS DANGEROUS

GRAIN IN THE SHOCK WILL
SOON BEGIN TO SUFFER

Great Deal of Alfalfa and Other
Hay is Down and is Being
Damaged

That the wet weather which has prevailed for several days is reaching the danger point is proven beyond doubt by the statements from different ranchers over the valley who have considerable grain in the shock and many of whom have large quantities of hay down.

For a few days after the rainy period began cheerfulness prevailed for the belief was that there is no chance in August for a long wet spell. Then the rains continued and some of the old timers consulted history's pages and found that many years ago grain rotted in the shock in Union county. That was when wheat was worth 73 cents a bushel and did not hurt so badly as now when the price is soaring heavenward. With this precedent in their minds the ranchers have begun to wonder if history is going to repeat itself and if this is the year slated for another wet August.

On the Walter Pierce ranch there are thousands of shocks of grain in the field, and some of the best grain ever raised in the valley. Fields that will throw from thirty to fifty bushels are thoroughly wet and the huge bundles of wheat lay soaked almost through and through. Alfalfa hay on the Pierce ranch is also down and is also wet.

And this is only one of the several large ranches where the grain and hay are suffering. Nothing but sunshine will aid and with several days more rain the Grande Ronde valley stands to lose quite a portion of a crop that is valuable not only in dollars and cents, but of far greater value to the world that needs foodstuffs this year.

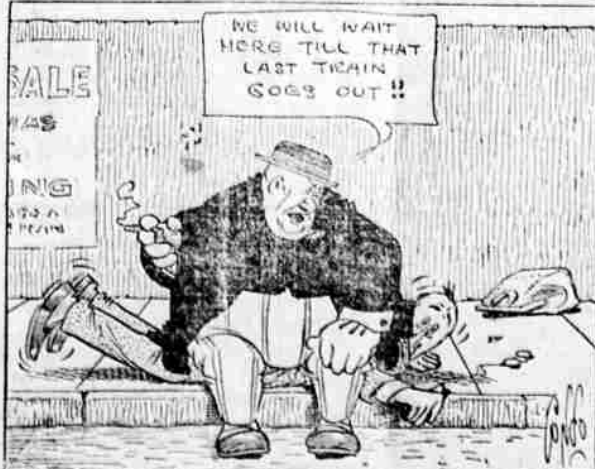
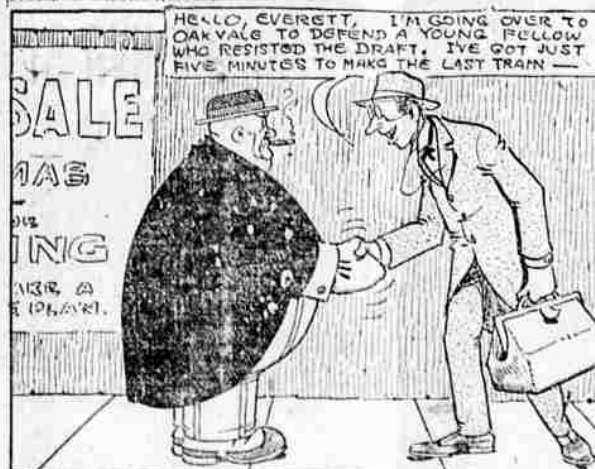
