"Oh, I say, you mustn't call him just Duke," remonstrated the official. "It's His Grace you must say."

The American appeared crestfallen at such a blunder, but was restored to normal a second later when a slap on the shoulder brought him about face to the Duke who had heard the conversation and was laughing.

"Come in," he said to the American, leading the way to the reporters' room.

Now the Duke is one of the "gang."
