We are a very happy lot, however, for the licker the Hun at his own game, and stopped him in his tracks. He tried time and time again to come through, but was met with cold steel, and was either annihilated or forced to retreat. We will have lots to tell when this is all over and it seems to be the beginning of the end. We are all anxious to be in it, and eager to get a crack at them. And the way these American lads go after them is a caution. And when they capture a Hun they can scarcely keep their hands off of them. Want to show them that they can wipe them off the face of the earth.

Don't know about mail these days, and perhaps it will be quite a spell between letters, for we are on the move when not in the trenches and don't get much time for letter writing. We go where needed most these days and that means we are very busy people. Then we lose sleep and try to catch up when the opportunity affords. I slept out in a wheat field two nights lately and was glad for the chance.

Two very interesting as well as instructive letters have been received from La Grande boys in France. They read in part as follows:

The first is from Sergeant Class Woods, Supply Co., 318 A. Z. P., via N. Y.:

"Here is my first letter in France, and does not it seem strange to be writing it in a Y. M. C.A. bungalow so many miles from home?"

"We are located for a few days in a rest camp. The idea is to give us a chance to get washed up before we make another move."

The habits of the French people are queer, but I guess they think the same of us.

"By the looks of things so far I will stay with the same outfit that I came over with. Hope so, anyway. For all the fellows are good sports and that is the 'hoie' thing in this army game. Just think, it has only been six months since I said 'I do.'" After you say those two words you want to have your eye on the ball and say "21," all the time. All it takes is a little head work.

"The way they railroad in France to bunk—use thirty pound rails and you should see some of the mikes. She is a fine old country over here, alright."

"We are located very near a large city, and the fort we are in was once occupied by one of our old historic conquerors. It certainly looks it too—stone buildings that were built many years ago."

"Am feeling fine, in the best of health and spirits and always looking forward to every move that we make for we see something new every time."

"Say hello to every boy for me."

J. L. Desilet writes from France as follows:

"We arrived in France safely and had a nice voyage. I was not a bit sea sick coming over, but some of my friends were."

"The natives here can't speak a word of English. The captain appointed me as interpreter for the Town Mayor. That's a good job. I have to do a bit of walking though."
