PRICES GIVEN ON FOOTSTUFF

CONSUMERS' CHARGES ARE RECORDED BY WAR BOARD.

Prevailing Cost of Foodstuff to the People Under Federal Order—Schedule Given.

At intervals the War Board goes over the local markets to see that no dealer is overcharging the public on foodstuffs. Each dealer is allowed to make a fair margin of profit under the federal rulings but no more, and for this reason the War Board's committee keeps tab on business of the city. The last schedule given out appears below:

- Wheat flour, per 1-16 bbl. bag (12 1/2 lbs.) 6 1/2c.
- Barley flour, per 1-16 bbl. bag, (12 1/2 lbs.) 8 1/2c.
- Cornmeal, less than 5 lbs. (package), per lb. 7 1/2c.
- White bread, 16 oz. retail price per loaf, 10c.
- Oatmeal or rolled oats (package), per lb. 36c.
- Rice, unbroken, standard quality, per lb. 10c.
- Hominy or hominy grits, per lb. 8c.
- Potatoes, white or Irish (old, new), per lb. 4c.
- Beans, colored, pinto or any other colored variety, per lb. 10c.
- Onions, per lb. 4c.
- Canned tomatoes, standard grade, per 26 oz. (No. 2) can, 14c.
- Canned corn, standard grade, per 20 oz. (No. 2) can, 14c.
- Canned peas, standard grade, per 20 oz. (No. 2) can, 14c.
- Canned salmon, tall red Alaska, per 16 oz. (No. 1) can, 15c.
- Evaporated milk (unsweetened) per 6 oz. can, 7c.
- Evaporated milk (unsweetened) per 16 oz. can, 13c.
- Milk, (bottled; dipped) per qt. 10c.
- Butter, creamery (tub; print) per lb. 55c.

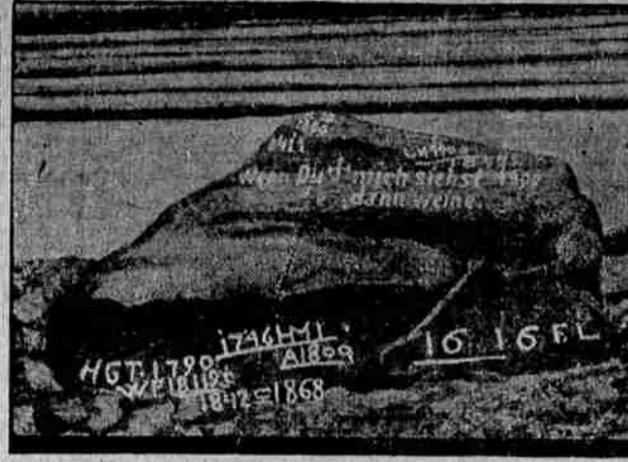

HUNGER STONE PREDICTS WOE FOR HUNS



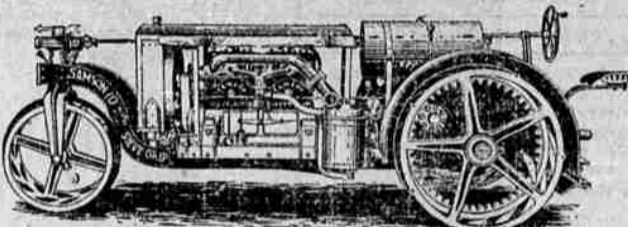
