property where the public transacts business with the railroad administration should be kept in clean and business-like condition. Windows should be washed, floors cleaned, lavatories disinfected, property well lighted, and the public conveniences kept in first class order at all times. This applies particularly to passenger and freight stations. Fifth—Quite an amount of irritation has been caused by delays occasioned in purchasing tickets at ticket windows. A study of these individual situations will suggest remedies and also methods whereby a lot of irritation can be eliminated, either by increasing the number of windows and employees or by the addition, as some railroads have done, of a floorwalker to discover and adjust peoples' needs and troubles and to assist them in securing tickets and accommodations; or by other methods which will occur to you.

In other words, if there is anything of an irritating nature which can be removed, it should be removed. It is desired that you make a thorough investigation of the conditions and see that whatever is necessary to be done is done, in order that the service to

the public may be made as non-irritating in character as possible, and of such a nature as will indicate to them that after taking care of the paramount war necessities, courteous service is the first aim of the administration.
