HOW TO "RAISE THE DOUGH"

LA GRANDE MERCHANT REFERS YOU TO "THE ROASTER."

Grocery Organ Gives Merit of the Use of Baking Powder—How It Can Be Done.

This "raising the dough" is the job before everyone, according to a La Grande merchant, and in order to do that raising in the proper manner he quotes from "The Roaster," a grocer's publication, as follows:

There are many ways of "raising the dough"—it might be through selling tags for some charity—cooking for Liberty Bonds. However this article deals with raising real dough that will eventually become our "staff of life."

The activities of the food administration form probably the most conclusive evidence of the importance to the high food value of flour is the leavening substances which render it more palatable and make the nutritive elements accessible for assimilation and maximum nourishment.

Man's use of flour as a food can be traced to the beginning of civilization and from the very first, leavening has shared attention with that given to the art of milling itself. As the centuries passed by improvement—were made in leavening processes and by a process of elimination but two principal methods remain in general use. One of them is by fermentation using yeast as the leavening agency, and the other is by the employment of baking powders.

Yeast is a cell organism that multiplies very rapidly in the presence of warmth and moisture, but it consumes sugar and starch in the process. It converts the natural sugar of the flour and a part of the starch into carbonic acid gas and alcohol. This carbonic acid gas—produced by the destruction of over two per cent of the flour—raises the dough and then escapes with the alcohol into the air.

The leavening effect of baking powder is produced by carbonic acid gas generated through the chemical combination of an alkali and an acid substance. The two substances are not chemically combined in the manufacture of baking powders, but are thoroughly mixed in the dry state. The chemical combination which produces the leavening gas is the result of the mixed powders coming in contact with moisture and heat.

cases of illness or accident, and the camps are generally located at points far distant from the regular military hospitals.

The problem has been met by the establishment, in each camp, of a small "tent hospital," where American soldiers suffering from minor ailments can be cared for satisfactorily. More than fifty of these tent hospitals have been set up in various small American camps during the past few weeks, each accommodating from four to ten patients. The soldiers welcome this arrangement enthusiastically, for the soldier when ill, likes to meet his friends and the men of his unit, and dislikes being transferred to a distant hospital in strange surroundings. During the recent prevalence of influenza in the camps, these tent hospitals proved a great boon.

A letter from an officer in an American camp in central England says:

"Another reminder of the careful thoughtfulness of the American Red Cross came to us this morning, and while you know how I have appreciated your help and wholehearted thoughtfulness in getting our hospital equipped, I want to tell you so in this way. I shall not try to enumerate the things you have given us. It is sufficient to say that, thanks chiefly to the American Red Cross, more than 600 American soldiers here can now have as good care and be as comfortable when sick as they could at home. We are especially appreciative of this because we previously had for a hospital only a small hut with plank beds, straw mattresses and no pillows."

"The magazines, newspapers and phonograph are greatly appreciated by our convalescents, and it would please you to see our 'Sun Room' this afternoon. The men

are sitting in comfortable, easy chairs, reading, smoking and gaining rapidly. The milk and eggs which you furnished are a big factor in rapid convalescence. On patient owes his life to the vaccine which you sent us last week and which we were unable to obtain from any other source."

"We had almost given up hope of getting what we considered necessary for the proper treatment of our sick soldiers; so you know something of how the present situation pleases me. The American Red Cross has a larger place in the forces helping to win the war than many of us realized before."
