THEIR RECORD KNOWN

With all the important and interesting events of the war to date, there is scarcely any operation that will eclipse in interest the attention of Americans that of the present drive toward Metz. This is essentially an American movement; it has been in course of preparation for a long period, according to the reports. It has a definite object, and it does not make much difference what that object is or what the military strategy surrounding it. The main thing which people at home believe, as they believe in the triumph of the eternal right, is that the Yankees will make good. The first reports indicate beyond doubt that the advance is proceeding according to the plans laid out with mathematical precision. Prisoners are pouring in, which is an attendant circumstance which may or may not have been planned as a part of the drive. But the only definite thing in the minds and hearts of Americans is that Pershing and his men will go through with what they undertake. It is not necessary to add encomiums to our boys in France. That has already been done in a measure full, whole hearted and complete. Premier Clemenceau said in the French House of Deputies: "The French generals tell me the victory was peculiarly American in its conception and execu-

tion. I am much impressed with the magnificent discipline, daring, and bravery of the American troops.

David Lloyd-George, Prime Minister of England, in speaking of our soldiers, said:

"We know that when they appear in the battle line they fight in a way worthy of the great traditions of their great country. This is in itself a source of support, sustenance, and encouragement to all those who with anxious hearts are watching the conflict going on in France."

The English and French Prime Ministers have only expressed the opinion of the world of the Americans in France. Our soldiers' part in the great drive against the Germans is worthy of our great Nation.

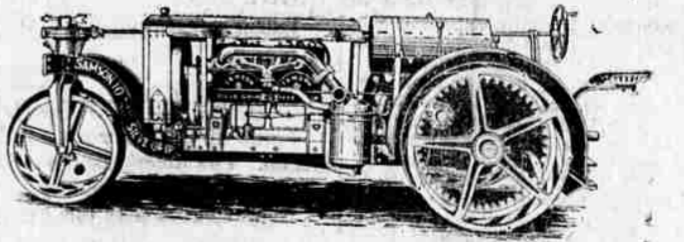
