MANY NATIONALITIES REGISTER AT HOT LAKE

AN ARMY ASPIRANT ACCOMMODATED—DR. PHY ON TRIP TO BOISE—CHAUTAUQUA REPRESENTATIVE AT SANATORIUM.

HOT LAKE, Sept. 13.—(Special.)—This small voting precinct, which, however, includes the Hot Lake Sanatorium registered 42 new candidates for Uncle Sam's trip to Berlin, via France. Besides the farmers and farm laborers of the district, the Hot Lake list was composed of many different representatives of foreign races and many varied industries. Amongst the former were English, Scotch, Irish, Danes, Swedes, Italians, Chinese, Japanese, Dutch, Greek and Austrians; and their trades or professions varied from priest to plumber.

One aspirant to army life was a man of over 47 years of age, born in America but lived most of his life in Scotland. He was very anxious to be registered, and he was duly accommodated by the registration board, which was composed of volunteers as follows:—Jar. Mulholland (chairman), Mrs. Reg. Herford, Mrs. O. Peehler, Neil McClure and Charles E. King. Some of those registered were patients in the hospital at the Sanatorium and, without exception, each of these expressed their desire to be made whole and healthy again to enable them to be taken in the front ranks.

BEFENDANT IS FOUND NOT GUILTY

CHARGE OF MAINTAINING NUISANCE AGAINST A. NEWLIN ENDS IN ACQUITTAL.

The trial of A. Newlin, of the La Grande Pharmacy, before Justice of the Peace Williams, on the charge of maintaining a nuisance, ended yesterday evening and, after a short deliberation, the jury brought in a verdict of not guilty.

The nuisance charge was brought in connection with the alleged purchase of intoxicating liquor by two strangers who were the chief witnesses for the prosecution.

The jury took the view that the circumstances showed that the action was a "frame-up" and the evidence submitted was accordingly discredited.

Witnesses were also introduced to show that the La Grande Pharmacy is conducted with orderliness and in this respect is not especially different from other business places in La Grande.

STUDENT TRAINING ENDORSED

Two La Grande People Express Themselves On This Matter.

The provisions that are being made by several of the colleges of Oregon in the efforts to encourage young men of the state to join the Students Army Training Corps is endorsed by two well known La Grande people.

Attorney Cochran's View

"The boys and girls of college age should not let their enthusiasm concerning the war prevent them from finishing their education," declares Attorney George T. Cochran, of La Grande, in urging boys to join the Students Army Training Corps. "This war is a war of the mind as well as of physical strength. Uncle Sam needs men trained in special lines. Some one has said that the war is a war of chemistry. While chemistry bears a very important relation to the prosecution of the war, yet there are other special and scientific lines that must bear their burden in order that even chemistry may perform its full quota of the work. After the war our boys and girls will need their college education to a still greater extent. Our country needs them at that time as well. A boy with half a education should not join the colors. He will serve his country best by preparing to serve most efficiently when his country most needs him."

Mrs. Ivanhoe Approves.

"If there is anything I can say or do," declares Mrs. A. E. Ivanhoe, superintendent of Union County schools, "to promote the cause of keeping our boys in the higher schools, I shall be glad to do it. If the registration of boys for army service is to be 18 years instead of 21, as heretofore, all school people have to pull hard to guide successfully the destiny of these young men. In all war work this office is ever ready to promote the efforts of our State Council of Defense."

Mrs. Ivanhoe has one son in the service and another in the selective draft.
