WITH THE COLORS

Among the La Grande boys who have received honors for their efficiency in the service is Curtis Lindsey, who left for Camp Lewis the 25th of last June. Contrary to Mr. Lindsey's expectations that he would be placed in the infantry division, he was utilized in the fire department at Camp Lewis as soon as it was found that he had experience in that work. Before being selected for Camp Lewis, Mr. Lindsey was employed in the fire department here. This training prepared him for the work of one of the chief fire-engine drivers, which work he is at present performing.

An article in the number for August 15th of "Trench and Camp" the official organ at Camp Lewis, is as follows:

"A spectacular fire run against time is to be pulled off on Washington avenue Monday evening at 6 o'clock. The boys of fire station No. 4 are expecting a record for others to try for a long time to come. The run is to be from the station, from a dead start, to the grain house on Washington avenue. The hope is to be taken to the top of the tower and connected and the water thrown from it. Stop watches will be held by the timers. As the boys of No. 4 have always been the first to reach every fire in their section, they are hoping to make a record which will entitle them to the championship of the camp. The members of the company are: First Sergt. L. Blinchery and Ptes. C. Swelling, F. La Zone, F. McNamara, O. Diahman, F. Daly and C. Lindsey."

At the scheduled time, the contest occurred and after a most thrilling race, Company 4 was awarded the coveted honor.

Mr. Lindsey has been transferred to the position of chief driver on Company 3.

Mrs. A. L. Richardson received a letter from her nephew, Frank Clark, who is a son of Mrs. D. M. Clark, and who left for the detention camp at the United States Naval Training School at Seattle, Washington, September 4th. Mr. Clark writes that at present there are 1,500 men in the school there, 900 of whom have arrived within the last week. He is apparently enjoying the life of the camp, as he states that he is well satisfied. Mr. Clark will remain at Seattle about 17 days more, after which time he will be transferred to the school at Bremerton.
