HOW CITIES ARE HELPING U.S. FOOD ADMINISTRATION



'Don't Waste Food' Sign on Municipal Building at Trenton, N. J.

The cities are helping to win the war by working with the United States Food Administration.

Trenton, New Jersey, was the first to adorn its municipal building with a striking sign advocating the conservation of food.

Atlantic City, also in New Jersey, has a huge day and night legend against the sky line which brings home the same need to the thousands that throng its beaches.

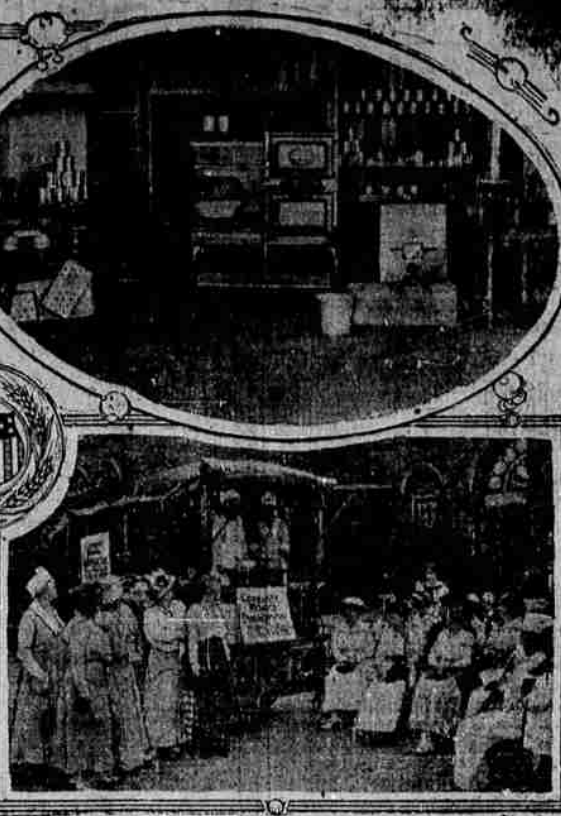
Washington, D. C., showed the first electric sign and has one with letters four feet high that blazes its message to thousands nightly.

Washington shows its spirit, too, by having conservation methods taught at Community Food Demonstrations, held at a city playground.

Palatka, Florida, maintains a community kitchen, equipped by a group of its leading citizens, where vegetables are brought from the surrounding country and canned.
