MAY BE EXCHANGED

Four Per Cent. Bonds Acceptable
For Those Quarter Per Cent.
Higher.

The Treasury Department again reminds holders of four per cent. Liberty Loan Bonds that these securities are convertible into 4 1/2 per cent bonds of the Third Liberty Loan, and extends a warning that this privilege lapses November 3 and cannot be renewed.

A statement issued over the signature of Secretary McAdoo says: "Holders of these 4 per cent bonds lose nothing by exercising the privilege of conversion and gain 1/2 per cent interest per annum. Holders of 4 per cent bonds should not wait until the last moment to exercise the privilege of conversion but proceed to do so promptly. Delay will result in overburdening the banking institutions of the country and the Treasury Department by making it necessary to handle all conversions at the last moment, and may result in the loss of the privilege of conversion altogether."

"Holders of coupon bonds are strongly advised to request issue of registered bonds in order to protect themselves against the risk of loss, theft and destruction of their bonds."

Official Department Circular No. 114, with forms of application, has been distributed to Federal Reserve Banks and banks and trust companies throughout the United States. These institutions are asked, as a matter of patriotic service, to assist bond holders in exchanging 4 per cent bonds for 4 1/2 per cent bonds and in registering their bonds.

LARGE ACREAGE OF WHEAT TO BE SOWN.

Reports being received by the Bureau of Crop Estimates from all wheat-growing sections show that plans are being carried out to increase the acreage of wheat both in the winter and spring wheat belts. The work is being held up in some districts only because lack of rain has prevented fall plowing and preparation of the seed bed. Washington reports: "If rain occur, an extraordinarily large fall wheat acreage will be sown." In Indiana much ground has been plowed for fall sowing, reports state, and an exceptionally large acreage is predicted. In Kansas great preparations have been made all over the State for fall sowing. Similar reports come from Missouri, Iowa, Montana and other States.

RED CROSS NOTES
AGAIN—DON'T USE BRIGHT COLORED YARN.

Frequently this division receives inquiries regarding the desirability of using colors for stripes in the tops, heels and toes of socks. There is no objection to using white or shades of gray for the tops but the heels and toes should be made from the same yarn as the sock proper. Under no condition should the use of bright colored yarns be encouraged, as very definite instructions on this point have been given out from national headquarters.

It should be of interest also to note that national headquarters advises against the purchase of knitting machines by the chapters for the present, owing to the temporary shortage of wool for knitting purposes.

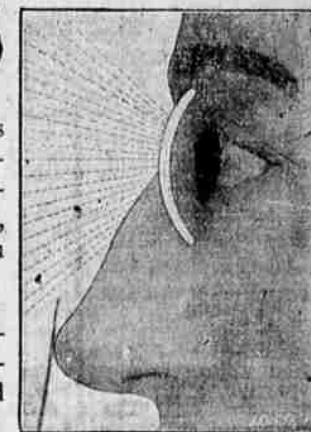
