THE TRUTH ABOUT CANDY

Conserving the Candy Industry

It is not the wish of the government to disintegrate industry.

When people realize the truth about the candy industry, they
immediately see that candy is a wonderful food product, rich in
nutritive values and a necessary food for people who work hard.

Sugar is recognized as a necessity. Yet few people take
their requirements of sugar a spoonful at a time, like a big pill.
Many people like the sugar in candy form. Thinking people
realize that one man is entitled to his sugar in candy form as
much as another is entitled to take his melted in coffee.

In 1916 (the last normal year in the industry), there were
approximately 2500 candy factories in the United States, using
about 8 per cent of the sugar used in the United States. (Really
a much smaller percentage than anyone thought.)

The capital invested in the industry was more than \$110-
000,000.

It was the thirty-eighth largest industry.

It employs normally one hundred thousand people, seventy-
five per cent of whom are women.

It also makes possible, to a large extent, the chocolate and
paper box industries, with millions invested, and employing
thousands of people—mostly women.

There are still people who believe that the candy industry is
using from 25 per cent to 50 per cent of the national sugar con-
sumption, and that the wiping out of the industry would solve
the sugar problem.

But, on the contrary, only 8 per cent sugar is used normally,
and today this has been cut to 4 per cent.

Reasonable people, with these facts before them, are realizing
that with only so small an amount of sugar going into candy, and
in view of the high food value of candy, it is time to consider the
facts and figures and to conserve in other directions for further
savings.

—In normal times the candy industry uses only 8
per cent of the sugar used per capita in this
country. Right now this amount has been cut
squarely in two.
