CLOTHING FOR THE BELGIANS

RED CROSS WILL TAKE CONTRIBUTIONS SEPT. 23-30.

Local Chapter And Branches Are To Supply A Quota Of Five Tons.

A drive for clothing for the Belgian people is to be conducted from September 23 to 30 and this movement is entrusted to the American Red Cross. The La Grande chapter and branches are expected to furnish five tons. The particulars are set forth in the following:

Every kind of garment, for all ages and both sexes, is urgently needed. In addition, piece goods—light, warm cotton flannel and other kinds of cloth from which to make garments for new born babies, ticking, sheeting and blankets, woolen goods of any kind—and shoes of every size are asked for. Scrap leather is needed for repairing footwear.

Since the clothes will be subjected to the hardest kind of wear, only garments made of strong and durable materials should be sent. It is useless to offer to any afflicted population garments of flimsy material or gaudy coloring. Make the gifts practical.

Garments need not be in perfect condition. A hundred thousand destitute women in the occupied regions are eager to earn a small livelihood by repairing gift clothing and making new garments adapted to needs with which they are familiar.

Raincoats, rubber boots or anything containing rubber. Note: Rubber heels can easily be removed from shoes.
Books, toys, soap, toilet articles. Notes or communications of any sort or description must positively not be sent.

WAR AIMS APPROVED

American Labor Leader Endorses Peace League Plans.

Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, presenting the proposals of that organization at the inter-allied labor conference today, said the delegation is unprejudiced and open-minded, but that it is bound by the principles expressed in the proposals. The following, he said, are essential fundamental principles for a peace treaty:

A league of free peoples; no political, economic or discriminatory restrictions, no indemnities or reparations for vindictive or injurious purposes, but to right manifest wrongs; recognition of the rights of small nations; no territorial changes except for the welfare of the people affected.

The American Federation of Labor delegation submitted the following proposals to the conference: That the conference is unqualifiedly determined to assist the allies in driving the central powers' armies from the invaded nations. Thus it is determined to oppose the central powers' armies so long as they are under control of the autocratic governments; that it endorses President Wilson's 14 points; that the workers should officially be represented on each belligerent delegation at the peace conference and that it favors a world labor conference to be held simultaneously.

C. L. Baine, American delegate, presided at the morning session. He said he hoped the conference would be able to arrive at unanimous conclusions regarding war aims, which he said, are so clear that neither friends nor enemies should misunderstand them.
