ALL ALLIED LEADERS PRAISE U. S. BOYS

BATTLE IS FOUGHT IN BIG STORM

ELEMENTS PLUS GERMAN GUNS FAIL TO STOP BRITISH IN ATTACK NEAR LEMPIRE

OPERATIONS NOW CENTER ON THE TRENCH SYSTEMS

Important Spurs And Mazes Which Constitute Buttresses Of Hindenburg Line Are Taken By Allies In Fighting Under Unusually Hard Conditions.

This is where the Germans hold strong outpost defenses before the Hindenburg line. Spurs leading from output ridges and trench mazes about Le Petit Preil farm made the going hard, but between 300 and 400 prisoners have already been reported taken.
