

CLOTHING FOR THE BELGIANS

RED CROSS WILL TAKE CONTRIBUTIONS SEPT. 23-30.

Local Chapter And Branches Are To Supply A Quota Of Five Tons.

A drive for clothing for the Belgian people is to be conducted from September 23 to 30 and this movement is entrusted to the American Red Cross. The La Grande chapter and branches are expected to furnish five tons. The particulars are set forth in the following:

Every kind of garment, for all ages and both sexes, is urgently needed. In addition, piece goods—light, warm cotton flannel and other kinds of cloth from which to make garments for new born babies, ticking, sheeting and blankets, woolen goods of any kind—and shoes of every size are asked for. Scrap leather is needed for repairing footwear.

Since the clothes will be subjected to the hardest kind of wear, only garments made of strong and durable materials should be sent. It is useless to offer to any afflicted population garments of flimsy material or gaudy coloring. Make gifts practical.

Garments need not be in perfect condition. A hundred thousand destitute women in the occupied regions are eager to earn a small livelihood by repairing gift clothing and making new garments adapted to needs with which they are familiar.

- Garments of flimsy material or gaudy coloring, ball dresses, high heeled slippers, etc.
- Stiff hats, either men's or women's straw, dress or derby.
- Raincoats, rubber boots or anything containing rubber. Note: Rubber heels can easily be removed from shoes.
- Books, toys, soap, toilet articles; Notes or communications of any sort or description must positively not be sent.

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT.

To the Honorable Commission of the city of La Grande:

Herewith I submit for your consideration my report for the week ending September 19, 1918: The fire chief reports one fire for the week. This was the fire at Fifth St. and Pennsylvania. The fire is reported to have been the result of spontaneous combustion originating in a pile of oily rags. There was no insurance on the building. Eleven volunteer firemen responded at a total cost to the city of eleven dollars. The Chief of Police reports one arrest for the week. This was for traffic violation. Amount of fines and forfeitures for the week, \$29. Number of lights out for the week 2.

The street and water department expended for labor during the week \$124.88. Twenty-four dollars and eighty cents of which is charged against the water department and \$100 against the street department. The street signs recently ordered by the commission have all been placed in position. Eleven of the fifty-six meters are now in position. The B. St. culvert has been completed. This is a stone and gravel fill with a concrete waterway. It was completed at a total cost of \$40. All the catch basins have been cleaned thoroughly, besides the several crossings and small culverts have been repaired, and in some instances, completely rebuilt. There is a crew of five men building the bulk head at the Beaver Creek spillway. The matter of setting the valves will be taken care of while we have the crew at the reservoir.

As per instructions of the Commission the fire chief has selected a hose to be sent off for relining and same is now ready for shipment. Inspected the septic tank, and find same to be functioning properly and all of the openings running freely. The electric generator used for re-charging the starting batteries on the fire truck ceased to work, but same has been repaired and is now doing its work properly. The road next the stockyards and also the street leading to Island City is quite rough and about thirty loads of gravel will be necessary to place it in proper condition. Would like authority from the commission to make the necessary repairs.

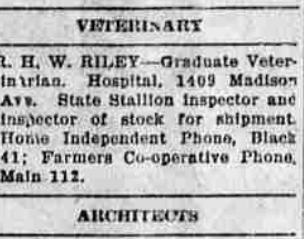
