HUNS STRUT WHERE RUSS HEROES BEG

(United Press Staff Correspondent) NEW YORK, Sept. 21.—One needs imposing military figures on the Nevsky Prospect in Petrograd these days.

They would be all right if they were all Russian. Here, for example, are two tall guards of the Regiment of Marie Louise. It will be remembered that these were the German warriors who, at the battle of Goldingen, taking off their tall heavy boots, beat it into a nearby woods, and when caught by the Russians and brought into the Russian lines nearly died of fear for their ultimate fate.

Here are some Death's Head Hussars from Danzig, the pitiable remains of a whole regiment cut to pieces by the Nijni Novgorod boys of Prince Debutoff. Further ahead you meet some of the Halberstadt hussars, Pomeranian uh-lans, Bavarians, Brandenburg grenadiers, and, finally, Hungarian hussars in red head dresses, remains of some of the great cavalry battles fought earlier in the war.

All these can be met on the Nevsky. They are dressed as if preparing for a parade. White and blue uniforms, as new as if they had just left the tailor. An expression of self satisfaction and brazenness is on their faces. The Prussian cheeks seem to be bobbing up and down with fat and a sense of their importance.

Who are they? Conquerors? No, they are merely prisoners of war captured in the days when the Russian army was still an army—before the cancer of bolshevism ate its heart away. But their attitude is that of the Hindenburgs and Mackensens. They seem to pose for statues of Mars. The bright rays of the sun play upon their elaborately gilded uniforms.

There are other war prisoners in the Nevsky. Nine out of 13 of them are on crutches. Some of them are without feet or hands and are obliged to jump about like crabs, begging alms. I have seen these fat Prussians and Brandenburgers stop near these human crabs, and puffing heavily on their cigars, hand alms to the crippled beggars. Then I have talked to these Russian war prisoners, who have just returned from captivity. I have heard their stories of suffering, hunger, insults and humiliations. They were treated like cattle, harnessed to wagons and plows by the German junkers in the fields. And in the concentration camps many died of hunger—quietly, silently, unnoticed. Many died while going about their work. They died in their dirty bunkers, or on dirty piles of straw, which would have repelled a cow. And they were all animated by one thought—to flee from the German nightmare. Not many were successful. Most of them were recaptured, at the very frontier.

And now, at last, they were permitted to return. They have returned not because of the Great Peace, but because they were no longer of use to either friend or foe. They have returned to their fatherland. And all are animated by the same thought, by the same thought: "We seem to be of no use, round here," they say. They seem to be in the way. They have acquired rheumatism in the trenches, and have given their blood for Russia. But why did they return? Was it worth while to come back for the pleasure of getting a dirty rouble bill from that fat, sleek Prussian?

list and their individual earning capacity and financial ability.

It is out of fairness to the patriotic majority that we have made these ratings. I want to emphasize that the emergency committee to whom all who rely on their neighbors to make the temporary loan in order to complete the quota for them, will be referred, is ready to listen to real reasons. It is not to our advantage to increase the number dependent on the government for support. But in every case that the amount decided upon as just and fair, is undersubscribed—in every case without exception, it will mean that that person will be considered by the committee of their neighbors and fellow citizens and their financial inability passed upon. In brief it will only make more work for the committee.

"Personally, I regret that there is no other way of settling the matter. It is in the light of a disgrace to this country and a victory to our common enemy that such professed Americans should exist among us. Fortunately, they are very greatly in the minority."

Ninety-Nine Per Cent Respond.

"This is every man's war. I, as every other person, should be ready to do his bit, but the very most that he can. I dislike to see one man shouldering another's burden. Their sympathies should be so deeply enlisted with the principle of this work that such reminders as may be necessary would cause them nothing other than shame in the eyes of the rest of their community."

"In the last loan, Union County led every loan district in the United States, although, through admitted error, credit was not received.
