The following is from Jerome Honeywell, Company D 127 Infantry, A. E. F. France, to his father Monroe Honeywell, of La Grande:

"Just a few lines while I am in the hospital to let you know we have won a good victory over the Boche. Oh, they can fight like a man, should they dig themselves in a hole and then turn a machine gun loose on you till you get up close to them and then they run. You can't get close enough to use a bayonet on them, but we can pick them off on the fly."

"But I got one before they got me with the gas. I only got one watch chain off him. This letter is the first one since July 1st when we went up on the line and then when we moved up on this sector. I believe, the Yanks can fight."

"I have gone through machine gun fire and artillery fire and everything else until they got me with gas. The gas is—well—awful. But they can't keep us down. We will be after them again in a week or so."

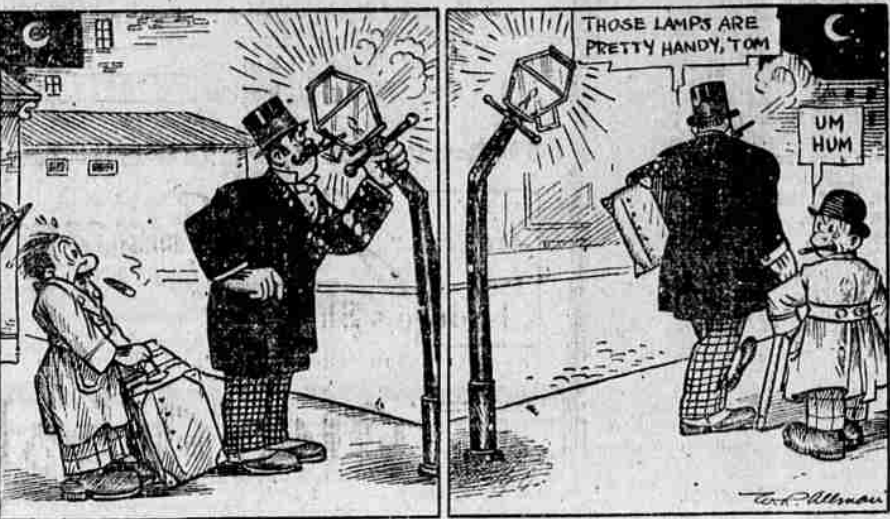
