BIG TRAINING SCHOOL

Many Take Advantage Of The College Army Course.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Sept. 26.—At least 2500 men in the students' army training corps at the college is the prediction by President W. J. Kerr. In fact, 2,200 applications have already been received. The War Department has authorized the construction of two additional barracks, making a total of five, including the large building now nearing completion and two smaller ones. These together with Cauthorn and Waldo halls, requisitioned for use of the men, give a total capacity of between 2,400 and 2,550 soldiers.

The S. A. T. C. members will be grouped in the south section of the campus. The new barracks will adjoin the parade grounds and the athletic field. The big gymnasium will be near at hand as well as other buildings used for instructional work. The Y. M. C. A. hut of cantonment type will be erected on the west quadrangle, facing the gymnasium and forestry buildings. Dr. D. V. Polling, formerly of Portland, in charge, will be assisted by another secretary and two aides.

The government has appointed nine physicians to conduct physical examinations, as soon as the men are inducted into the service upon arrival. All men are expected to report Monday, September 30. Colonel Alfred C. Sharpe, commander, will be assisted by a large group of regular army officers, together with the College men who received special training at the Presidio.

JEWES ARE PATRIOTIC.

Portland Hebrew Congregation Liberal In Money And Men.

The Portland Telegram of Wednesday says:

A striking example of what churches can do to aid the Liberty loan in addition to exhortation, was given yesterday evening at the Jewish synagogue at Sixth and Hall streets. During the services addresses were made by D. Solis Cohen, E. V. Littlefield and Captain Allen, and pleas were made for subscriptions. In 30 minutes \$102,000 were subscribed in individual amounts ranging from \$50 to \$25,000.

During the drive for the third loan this same congregation contributed \$71,000. There are 205 members of the congregation, 75 of whom are in the service. Of this number, fully two-thirds were volunteers.
