

BULGARIA HAS NOW GIVEN UP

Unconditional Surrender; Allies' Demands Met; Hostilities Cease

NEWS OF SURRENDER IS CONFIRMED BY REPORTS FROM SEVERAL SOURCES

SERBIAN FORCES HAD CUT OFF RETREAT OF BULGARIANS AND WERE STILL ADVANCING.

Belief In Washington That the Germans Will Send An Army to Take the Place of the Bulgars On the Serbian Front.

LONDON, Sept. 30.—(By United Press.)—Bulgaria has surrendered unconditionally, according to an Agency dispatch received here and confirmed by the Serbian legation. The Allies and Bulgars ceased hostilities at noon today.

ARMISTICE HAS BEEN SIGNED.
PARIS, Sept. 30.—(By United Press.)—The Bulgarian armistice has been signed, according to advices received here this afternoon. Reports say that all military conditions imposed by the Allies have been accepted.

ENEMY WILL NOW BECOME ALLY.
WASHINGTON, Sept. 30.—(By United Press.)—Bulgaria will be friendly to any allied moves against Turkey and will be practically on the side of the Allies for the remainder of the war, Bulgarian Minister Panaretov told the United Press today.

INTERVENTION NOT NOW NECESSARY.
WASHINGTON, Sept. 30.—(By United Press.)—Bulgarian Minister Panaretov today submitted to Secretary of State Lansing a communication from Bulgaria asking the United States to use its good offices in helping conclude an Allied-Bulgarian armistice.
Inasmuch as the armistice is reported as already signed, no further steps will be taken by this government.

RETREAT WAS CUT OFF.
LONDON, Sept. 30.—(By United Press.)—The Serbians had captured Carevofello, cutting off the Bulgarian retreat, it is officially announced by the Serbian war office. The Serbians and French are now within twelve miles of Uskub.

The Serbian official report says, "By a bold maneuver, we took Carevofello, cutting off the Bulgarian retreat. We took more than 700 prisoners and twenty guns."
"At St. Nicholas ten enemy regiments tried to defend the town, but our strong attack compelled them to abandon it. We are now ten kilometers to the northward."

"Serbians and French have taken dominating heights on the left bank of the Pechinja river, twelve miles east of Uskub."

BELIEF THAT GERMANY WILL FILL BREACH
LONDON, Sept. 30.—Germany will immediately move her armies into Serbia and establish a new line, as a result of the Bulgarian armistice, was the belief expressed in official circles here this afternoon.

PRESIDENT CALLS ON SENATE TO PASS SUFFRAGE AMENDMENT

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30.—(By United Press.)—Shortly and sharply President Wilson today called upon the United States senate to pass a constitutional amendment granting women full and equal suffrage with men. As commander-in-chief of the army and navy, he declared "suffrage to be vitally essential to the successful prosecution of the great war for humanity."

By granting it, the President declared it his duty to "ask you to remove every obstacle that stands in the way of winning the war."

UNION COUNTY REPORTED OVER

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THE GREAT MOTHER

Soldier Tells Of Devotion To The Red Cross Banner.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30.—When a wounded soldier is dying, his last words are usually "Tell Mother." A last message from a U.S. Marine who was killed in France has just come to Washington, for the "greatest mother in the world," Pvt. Edmund B. Rowe, of the 81st Co., Machine Gun Battalion, U. S. Marines, wrote from a little town in France, on July 14th, Bastille Day, to an American Red Cross official, telling him that the soldier has learned to love that banner as well as he loves the Stars and Stripes.

"If you could only see," he continued, "the expressions of comfort and cheer which your generous donations bring to the dirty, weary countenances of recipients, you would feel highly remunerated for your outlay of time, labor and money. I want the American people and especially all members of the Red Cross to know just how every soldier feels toward your great organization."

The letter bore this postscript from Lieut. Baker, of the Marines: "It is with great sorrow that I add these few words. Pvt. Rowe, a member of my section, was killed in action several days after he wrote this and before he had an opportunity to mail it. He was a fine soldier and a real man."

STATE AS WHOLE NEARLY OVER

BUT PORTLAND BETWEEN 3 AND 4 MILLIONS BEHIND

Committee Is After The Slackers Roughshod And Will Make Them Come Through.

Oregon is waiting on five districts that are lagging in the fourth Liberty loan campaign. The few counties other than the five are not yet over the top, but are gaining so rapidly that they will be over before night. The five districts are Clatsop, Umatilla, Marion and Jackson counties and the city of Portland. The state lacks less than \$700,000 of being over and Portland something between three and four millions.

Portland is today conducting a slacker drive, going particularly after certain wealthy individuals who have passed off their duty with a subscription a tenth of what it ought to be. The Portland committee held up three prominent slackers in the public press this morning, and the local drive will be replete with sensations if matters do not take a turn for the better immediately. The committee made announcement this morning that its actions henceforth would be drastic and already a visible increase in the quota is noticeable in the booths where Liberty loan subscriptions are being taken. The three cases of publicity include John Clark, of the Clark Saddlery Company; William Isensee of 206 North Twenty-Fourth St.; C. Walk, of Forty-Second Street, Southeast.

MINORS MAY FILE

Public Domain Is Open To Those Under 21 In War Service.

The Register and Receiver of the United States Land Office here have received detailed information in regard to the Special Service Act which relates to the filing of homestead entries during the present war. Special attention is directed to Article 8 of this act. It reads as follows:

"Any person under the age of 21 who has served or shall hereafter serve in the army of the United States during the present emergency shall be entitled to the same rights under the homestead and other land and mineral entry laws, general or special, as those over 21 years of age now possess under said laws, provided:

"That any requirements as to establishment of residence within a limited time shall be suspended as to entry by such person until within six months after his discharge from military duty, provided:

"That application for entry may be verified before any officer in the United States or any foreign country authorized to administer oaths by the laws of the state or territory in which the land may be situated."

BRITISH ENTER CAMBRAI AND FRENCH IN MILE AND QUARTER OF ST. QUENTIN

GERMANS RETIRING FROM CHEMIN DES DAMES, HALF OF WHICH IS HELD BY THE FRENCH.

Americans Are Included In Operations Which Are Hedging In the German Stronghold—Hindenburg Line Again Broken By Allies.

LONDON, Sept. 30.—Haig reports that the British entered Cambrai and reached the junction of the Arras-Cambrai and Bapaume-Cambrai roads, on the western edge of the city.

FRENCH NEARING ST. QUENTIN.

PARIS, Sept. 30.—(By United Press.)—French troops are now within a mile and a quarter of the center of St. Quentin, according to battlefield dispatches received late this afternoon. They are also pressing on Urvillers Wood, east of St. Quentin, and on the Pere road, where they are close to the Hindenburg line.

GERMANS RETIRE FROM CHEMIN DES DAMES.

LONDON, Sept. 30.—(By United Press.)—The Hindenburg line has been broken to a depth of two miles on an eight-mile front north of St. Quentin, according to British front dispatches this afternoon.

The French now hold half of the Chemin Des Dames. Germans are retiring in that region.

Americans are included in this operation, as they are fighting as far south as Bellincourt and only seven miles north of St. Quentin.

NO TRAFFIC ON SUNDAYS

STATE COUNCIL OF DEFENSE ADOPTS DRASTIC PLANS.

Also Endorses The Week-day And Saturday Evening Hours For Closing.

A resolution adopted by the state council of defense will no doubt lead to very limited business transactions on Sundays in the state of Oregon, and the week-day closing hour at 6 in the evening, with the exception of Saturdays, when the closing hour is fixed at 9 o'clock, is also endorsed. Only the absolutely essential business traffic is recognized by the state board as being permissible on Sundays. The resolution is:

Resolved, That on and after October 1, 1918, all sales of merchandise at any point within the state of Oregon, on the first day of the week commonly known as Sunday, at any time after 9 p.m. on Saturday, or at any time after 6 p.m. on any other day of the week should be discontinued during the continuance of the war; provided, that such sales may be made at the selling of meals or articles of food in restaurants, hotels, lunch counters and eating rooms shall not be deemed the sale of merchandise under the terms of this resolution; and provided, further, that the sale of gasoline, distillate and lubricating oil at garages and public filling stations, except in the supplying of motor trucks actually engaged directly or indirectly in war industries, shall be deemed the sale of merchandise and subject to the terms and conditions of this resolution.
