

WAR EXHIBITS ATTRACT MANY

ed them. The move proved a winner for the county, if a crowded house can be termed that, as the Union county exhibit, taking everything in connection was the most popular place on the grounds. Many people tried to purchase the war relics, and one enterprising man, whose demonstration depended upon securing a crowd, wanted to hire the exhibit to carry along with him.

"You would be surprised," said Mrs. Palmer, "at the large number of people throughout the state who looked at the photograph of the hospital unit, which was part of the exhibit, and pick out the boys that they knew. The Union county booth, of course, was the gathering place for former Union county people who visited the fair, so they were more or less acquainted with the young men. Then when the news of the exhibit became known, it also became the mecca of those throughout the state who had boys over there. One man called who had lost a son at Chateau-Thierry; another had a son wounded there, and so it went. The humorous as well as the pathetic side of the war developed in different visitors as well—the French magazine, with its touch of what the Americans might term 'the obscene,' were relished by many, while hundreds of mothers seemed to think their children had a treasured memory or something to tell the folks at home about when they donned the German gas masks or wore one of the German helmets. And, although everything was plainly labeled, the questions kept coming from bystanders all the time for more explicit information.

That the county's enterprise was appreciated in sending the exhibit is evidenced by the press notices received, two of which, the first from the Salem Journal and last from Portland Journal, are here extracted from:

"Union county itself has some wonderful treasures, but people who visit the booth hardly look at these for the thing that attracts attention is the war relics case, guarded by Mrs. C. N. Palmer. It is strictly an Oregon exhibit sent home by the boys of the La Grande hospital unit with the Rainbow division in France. Mrs. Palmer herself has a son in the unit. The relics have never before been displayed, as they have only been in this country two weeks. Among them is the picture of a gun which bombarded Paris. The boys were camped near there and secured some nuts and bolts from the 'Bertha' which are in the case."

"Salem Journal. Union county is well represented, as in addition to its exhibit of products showing the resources of the county it has an intensely interesting exhibit of souvenirs from Chateau-Thierry and other battle fields.

"There war souvenirs were gathered by members of the field hospital corps which was recruited in Union county and sent over to France in the Rainbow division. The exhibit is in charge of Mrs. C. N. Palmer, whose son is in the corps. One of the German gas

masks and a German helmet with a bullet hole through it, showing where the Hun 'got his,' went sent by her son. The hospital unit has been in actual service since March 1 and Union county is very proud of her boys—Portland Journal."

Those having souvenirs in the exhibit were:

George Correy: Camouflaged helmet.

Mrs. J. J. Carr, helmet, shell case, shrapnel, not from a 'Big Bertha' gun. Hun cap, water bottle, gas mask.

P. A. Foley: Two bolts from a 'Bertha' gun, 2 vases, 1 helmet.

T. J. Scroggin: 75 shell and helmet.

Frank Parsons: Helmet, French poster, French magazine, Hun cap, Prussian Guard cap, sleeve from German uniform, 2 chevrons, shrapnel and water bottle.

C. N. Palmer: Helmet, German cap, gas mask, pieces of shrapnel, camouflaged airplane covering.

Fred Correy: Helmet and parts of a 'Big Bertha.'

Mrs. Moon: Helmet and German officer's pipe.

Mrs. Larsen: German helmet.

Where possible the visitors were allowed to handle the relics and many went away only to return with neighbors or relatives who were especially interested because of personal representatives on the French battlefields from which the collection were gathered.
