NEW CUTTER TELLS OF LATE CLOTHES STYLES

GOVERNMENT ORDER ON WEARING APPAREL IS EXPLAINED BY DAHLIN

G. Dahlin, of Seattle, arrived yesterday, and today is in charge of the cutting department of the Toggery. Mr. Dahlin is well known on the coast as a high-class cutter and designer of men's and women's apparel.

In speaking of the new government regulations on clothing today he said: "The federal government is asking nothing unreasonable, its orders merely follow the general line of conservation which the country is now practicing because of the war. For instance the cuffs on men's trousers as well as belts on the coats have been recommended for abolishment, and only plain, wholesome clothes are recommended to the people. The same is true of women's clothing. The government urges that all unnecessary fullness and trimming be eliminated, but at the same time suggests plain, neat fitting sensible garments. No one must think that because of the regulations clothing, both men's and women's, will not appear well. Our profession prides itself in furnishing the plain clothes in attractive form, for after all, good common sense styles are the styles worth while and it is well that the government has stopped the extreme styles and forced every tailor to make a suit that will not go out of style when the autumn leaves fall. From now on clothes will be clothes and the suit bought this fall will be in perfect style next year."

DELINQUENT MAKES GOOD

Wealthy Pendleton Man Subscribes His Assigned Quota.

Hans Pahl, exposed, yesterday as a liberty loan shirker, today set himself right to the best of his ability by subscribing for his entire \$2500 quota, says the East Oregonian. In taking his share of the bonds, through the American National Bank, Mr. Pahl made the following statement to the service league:

To the Unitilla County Patriotic Service League:

This is to advise you that I have today purchased my full quota of Liberty bonds. I am a loyal American citizen and shall always try to do my duty as such. Owing to obligations to meet and that it will be necessary for me to borrow the money to carry the bonds, I did not realize that I was not doing my full duty in not subscribing more than seemed to me just under all circumstances.

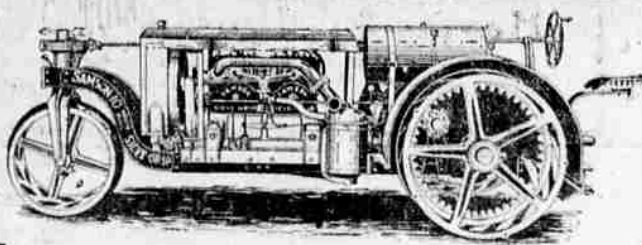
