TURKS MAY STAY WITH GERMANY

(Continued from Page One)

HUNS MAY FIGHT IN BALKANS

LONDON, Oct. 5.—Germany, if reports from a neutral center can be relied upon, is going to make a great effort to maintain communication over the Orient Railway with Turkey, and thus hopes to keep her Eastern ally in the war. According to a Hague dispatch to the Central News, 250,000 German and Austro-Hungarian troops have arrived at Sofia from Rumania and while part of these will remain in Sofia as an argument favoring the overthrow of the Malinoff government, the majority will endeavor to keep the allied troops from the Orient railway which joins Germany and Austria with Constantinople, the construction of which was, a few years ago, hailed as the greatest achievement of the central powers.

The removal of troops from Rumania, however, is not without danger. A few weeks ago, when appealed to by his colleagues on the western front for assistance, Field Marshal von Mackensen reported that conditions in Rumania did not warrant the transfer of a single soldier to that country. Now Rumanians are predicting that if the Rumanian army does not rejoin the allies there will be at least a visiting in that country which will completely nullify the Bucharest treaty, so far as it provides for the revivification of the central powers.

German papers, too, express suspicion of the crown council held on Saturday, ostensibly for a discussion of the crown prince's marriage, but in which other matters might be discussed. The presence at this council of ex-premier Bratiano, who was favorable to the allies, is strongly commented upon by the German press.

HOT LAKE ATTACHES CONTINUE LOYAL WORK

LOAN QUOTA IS OVER-SUBSCRIBED — WAR LECTURES AT THE LAKE — DR. PHY'S SON TO JOIN MARINES.

HOT LAKE, Oct. 4.—(Special.)—At the monthly meeting of the Hot Lake Sanitarium Mutual Welfare Society (which is composed exclusively of members of the sanitarium staff, a resolution was adopted to pay out of the society's funds the sum of \$65 to pay for woolen yarn and linen which some of the staff had used up in making sweaters and other Red Cross hospital supplies and requirements. On several former occasions, this small but energetic society has voted amounts from their treasury to meet calls of different kinds, all of which, however, are for the welfare of someone or something where financial help is urgently needed.

Hot Lake's quota in the present Liberty Loan drive is rated at \$1,325, but this amount has already been exceeded and the end is not yet.

Forty-two members of the Sanitarium staff have taken up liberty bonds to the extent of \$2,500 and there are more coming.

Dr. Phy's son Mark returned from Portland yesterday, where he made arrangements with the military authorities for him to join the marine service as soon as ever the registration board get to his registered number of the last draft. He joins as private, but with the idea of specializing in one of the marine departments at the first opportunity.

Mrs. McAlister, wife of Dr. McAlister, assistant physician to Dr. Phy, returned to the Sanitarium yesterday, after a long visit to western Oregon and the state of Washington. Their son Nathaniel, who, up to few days ago was on the Sanitarium staff, has entered the O. A. C. at Corvallis to go thru the semi-military class now forming there.

Dr. McAlister's eldest son, a sergeant in the U.S. Medical Corps is somewhere on the Pacific Ocean on his way to somewhere in Asia.

Charles E. King has given several interesting talks on the war to the guests at the Sanitarium during the past week. He illustrates his talks by a series of maps and plans drawn in chalk on a large blackboard.

Each of those evenings, Dr. Phy, who is district chairman of the National Defense Committee, delivers some words of exhortation to those assembled to swell the totals for the Fourth Liberty loan.

They will then dry and harden right through, and while the cleansing power of the soap will be in no way diminished it will last twice as long.
