

BACK FROM MEETING

County And City School Superintendents In Educational Work

Mrs. A. E. Ivanhoe, county school superintendent and Professor A. C. Hampton, superintendent of the city schools returned yesterday from Salem, where they attended a meeting of the executive committee of the State Teachers' Association. They report a most satisfactory session, several matters in regard to the coming state convention being decided upon. The Association will meet in Portland sometime in December, the definite dates not having yet been decided upon. Dr. H. D. Sheldon, dean of the school of education at the University of Oregon, was appointed to secure the talent for speakers and others appearing on the program. It was further ordered that proceedings of the State Institute be published in bulletin form for distribution to teachers. "We feel greatly encouraged by the splendid co-operative spirit developing among teachers of the state," said Mr. Hampton, this morning. "Our primary purpose is uniting the Eastern Oregon and Western Oregon conventions about two years ago was to develop an organization which would represent the teachers of the entire state, whose problems are in many ways similar. These aims have already in a large measure been realized."

SUMPTER VALLEY IS FACING A TIE-UP

Expected Walkout Will At Least Cripple Train Service

Whether or not the expected walkout of Sumpter Valley trainmen and shop employes will result in a tie-up of traffic or not was uncertain last evening, but General Manager Penza stated that he thought in any event the passenger service could be maintained. The movement of the men to enforce their demands for a wage increase can hardly be considered a strike movement. Some of the men involved have tendered their resignation the past few days and some have signified their intention of staying on the job. Today was the date fixed for the walkout, but it is understood that all trains on the road will be brought in by their crews and that the shopmen will not go out until Monday. Nothing has been heard from the appeal to the Federal Railroad Administration, but it seems very likely that unless the government takes control, enough men will quit to at least seriously cripple the road's operation.—Baker Democrat.
