NO MORE TO BE TAKEN AT O. A. C.

MAXIMUM CAPACITY OF COLLEGE HAS BEEN REACHED.

War Work Has Attracted Many Younger Men From All Parts of the State.

CORVALLIS, Or., Oct. 9.—(Special).—No more applications will be accepted for induction into Class 11, the vocational section of the students' army training corps at the Oregon Agricultural College.

The college has been exacting in its requirement that all applicants should be qualified for the work according to the war department's standards and the physical examinations by physicians appointed by the government have eliminated a certain per cent of the applicants. Notwithstanding this, however, the maximum capacity of the college for work in this section has been reached. It is felt that the standard of the work throughout the institution should be maintained, and that beyond this limit it would not be justified in the interest of the student, the government, or the institution in receiving applicants.

Those whose applications have already been received and who have the necessary qualifications, will be provided for. The college authorities regret having to close the opportunities for this training for war service, but under the circumstances it is deemed unavoidable. The college, however, is particularly well equipped to give the men who have applied, the work required by the war department.

WITH THE COLORS

Eugene E. Alford, Base Hospital 15, writes to home folks of amusing experiences in his work. He says in part:

"We are now in Noyers, down in southern France, and leave here at 12:55 tonight.

"This is a nice city with a population of about 50,000. It has nice big stores, big resident houses with nice grounds around them and a very beautiful park to rest and lie around in. You would never know there was a war here only by seeing soldiers and a few convalescents.

"We had quite a funny experience with our patients. You see there was only a corporal and myself in charge of fifty men. All one place on the road we had to change trains. We were supposed to pull in there at 4:15 in the morning, and instead were four hours late. Of course, our other train had left. The train we were on, in order to make up time, did not stop long enough for our luggage and more crippled patients to get off—and some of them were asleep too.

"After we got off we went to a Red Cross camp and had breakfast. By the way, you have to head it to the Red Cross for doing good work here. It seems they do more here than up front.
