DEFICIENCIES STARTLING

STATE INSTITUTIONS CALL FOR MORE MONEY.

Deficiency Board Sees Big Sums But Is Now Seeking Advice.

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 12.—Deficiency appropriations totaling \$164,450 were authorized by the state emergency board at its meeting recently. Since the last legislature adjourned the emergency board has now authorized deficiencies which aggregate \$511,950.

The board did not allow all the requests presented. It turned down entirely a request from the state line board for an additional \$2000, this board having been given \$5000 a few months ago, and it cut the penitentiary appropriation from \$40,000 to \$35,000, and took under advisement the request of the Oregon Agricultural college for funds to meet the emergency arising from the great enrollment of student soldiers until the opinion of the attorney general can be obtained as to the legality of allowing this request.

The request for funds for the O.A.C. was presented by President W. J. Kerr and J. K. Westford, president of the board of regents. President Kerr asked for a total of \$53,438 to aid in the construction of barracks, remodeling buildings and other improvements and providing additional equipment and teachers.

When members of the emergency board objected to an item of \$6000 included in the total for aid in construction of barracks for the soldiers, President Kerr volunteered to withdraw his request and make arrangements with friends of the college to finance this construction work until the legislature can make appropriation for it. This left a sum of approximately \$37,000 which President Kerr said the college absolutely must have if it is to perform the duties asked of it by the war department and take care of the students who are now on the campus.

Members of the board, with the exception of Senator Moser, expressed their willingness to authorize the deficiency if the board has legal authority to do so, but they were unanimously in favor of putting the matter up to the attorney-general before any action was taken. Secretary of State O'Connell told them that he would issue no certificate of indebtedness until after the attorney-general has passed on the question. If the attorney-general's opinion is favorable the board will be called into session again, probably next Wednesday.

This request was considered to be different from the others allowed for the reason that the last legislature had made no appropriation at all for the purposes for which the deficiency is now desired. Oregon state hospital \$100,000; industrial school for girls \$35,000; state tuberculosis hospital \$9,000; state tuberculosis school for boys, \$14,000; penitentiary \$35,000; penitentiary pumping plant \$750; board of inspection of child labor \$1000; capitol building and grounds \$1700.

The food administration has authorized District Representative Houser, at Portland, to grant modifications of the 60-day storage rule so as to permit storage of grain up to six months.
