SPEAKERS TELL MEN VICTORY MUST COME

Complete Victory Over Germany Is Keynote Of Program.

CAMP LEWIS, Oct. 14.—A complete victory over Germany was the keynote of a Liberty day program here today. More than 40,000 soldiers and civilians listened to speakers denounce the military system of Germany. The three principal speakers were Governor Lister of Washington, the Rev. Dr. Mark A. Mathews of Seattle and Rev. James Freeman of Minneapolis, who has but recently returned from France.

Health reports show 427 cases of influenza among the soldiers during the past week. This is an increase of 309 cases over 128, reported in the last previous health report. Pneumonia also increased this week, 88 cases being reported, as against 59 cases last week. Only nine deaths, all from pneumonia, were reported.

FUNERAL TO BE HELD PRIVATE

Body Of E. Polack Will Arrive Here Wednesday Morning.

The body of E. Polack, who died at Rochester, Minn., will arrive in La Grande Wednesday morning and the funeral will take place at the Polack home on Wednesday afternoon. Owing to orders from the state health department bearing directly upon the epidemic of influenza, the funeral will be private.

The body will be held pending the erection of a vault in the Masonic cemetery. The Elks lodge, of which Mr. Polack was a prominent member will, as soon as the ban is lifted for public gatherings, hold appropriate memorial services for their departed brother to which the public will be invited.

Two of Mrs. Polack's brothers and her niece will arrive tomorrow from North Platte, Nebraska, and another brother is accompanying the body.
